CROAKERS.

Parton says that in Boston there
are fifteen men the most miserable
perhaps of any of God's creatures
on the earth; not because they are
poor in this world's goods, for they
are all wealthy; not because they
are ill with bodily afflictions, for
they have good health; not because
they lack any of the privileges or
comforts that usually go to make
men happy, for all these they have
in abundance; but because every-
body and everything is doing wrong.
The City Council is studiously de-
vising means to ruin the city, its
credit, its morals, its religion, its
everything, churches are teach-
ing heresy. Temperance socie-
ties are depriving the people of
their liberties, teachers are advanc-
ing their pupils too fast to insure
solid learning, machinery is manu-
facturing articles of little value, in
comparison to the old time hand-
made implements, Legislators are
intent on subverting every thing to
the ruin of the State, Senators,
Congressmen, Cabinets and Presi-
dent, lie awake at night devising
means to crush the liberties of the
people, and utterly destroy and per-
ish the government of the United
States from the earth, Kings, Prince-
s, Potentates and the rulers of all
nations, are conspiring with each
other in the endeavor to blot out
order, and inaugurate a reign of
terror over all the earth, never
more to be restored to the condition
of a decent habitation for man.

Chaos and old night as it was be-
fore "God said let there be light"
is the inevitable tendency of all
things. These are the reasons why
these men sit and croak over the
wickedness of the times and the cor-
ruptions of the hour. The case is
too hopeless to take hold and assist
in a reformation, and they prefer
to sit and wait impatiently for impend-
ing doom. Boston is not alone, Mr.
Parton could find a wider field for
the collection of such fossils in the
far West, where it requires no re-
search to find them in greater num-
bers than fifteen in even the small-
est cities. We have known dozens
of men bowed prematurely to the
earth, and who mope about the
streets as if in great bodily agony,
that on being questioned were con-
scious of no physical disease, and
were actually hurrying themselves
off to an early grave, apparently to
avoid the wreck of matter and crush
of worlds that Radical rule is about
to entail on all the works of crea-
tion. We present a more cheerful
view of the future, in the inaugural
address of the President this morn-
ing, but as Grant is in the "deep and
damnable scheme" of course accord-
ing to these "Ghastly grim and
ancient ravens," these words of
cheer are but deceptions, and we
shall still hear the melancholy
birds croaking "nevermore, never-
more."

The State Capital Reporter quotes a pas-
sage from Grant's Inaugural Address and ex-
claims, "Why, that is the very foundation
of a Democratic Government." To be sure
it is, but very foreign to the Democratic
party. The trouble with the Reporter is
that it has not learned to discriminate be-
tween Democracy and the party that arro-
gates to itself that time-honored name.

Grant's Cabinet.—Following is the
new Cabinet: Secretary of State, E. B.
Washburn; Secretary of the Treasury, A. T.
Stewart of New York; Secretary of the Navy,
Adolph E. Borie; Secretary of the Interior,
J. D. Cox, of Ohio; Attorney-General, E. R.
Hoar, of Massachusetts; Postmaster-General,
John A. J. Crosswell, of Maryland. No Sec-
retary of War is named.

That there are appointments in the above
list that were unexpected is perhaps as great
a recommendation as any it possesses. In
setting aside old politicians for new men,
men whose lives have been spent in trade or
some of the professions, the President
but recognizes the claims of all classes.

E. B. Washburn is the only man in the
Cabinet who can be said to have been a noted
politician, and the wisdom of selecting him
for the State Department will not be ques-
tioned by any one who wishes the place well
filled, when his long and faithful services,
his acknowledged ability and unswerving
honesty and patriotism are remembered.

The appointment of Alex. T. Stewart has
surprised nearly every one; never having
held an office, of course the public know but
little of his ability, except that he has had
financial sense enough to acquire several
millions in trade. The President has doubt-
less good reason to believe him competent,
and he is yet to be mistaken in his judgment
of men.

Of Governor Cox we know but little, ex-
cept that he commanded over Grant on the
Potomac, where a good opportunity to judge
of his qualifications must have resulted satis-
factorily, and as Governor of Ohio.

John A. J. Crosswell has been United
States Senator from Maryland, acquitted
himself very honorably, and distinguished
and stamped himself a man of power and
goodness in his masterly oration over the
dead body of his colleague, Hon. Henry Win-
ter Davis. The other members are new men.

The Yuba District, South Boise is
deservedly attracting much atten-
tion, we have not had the pleasure
of examining any of the rich ores
recently discovered in the Atlanta
party, but are assured by reliable
ladies, that at a depth of one hun-
dred and twenty feet in what is
known as the Adkins claim, the ledge
is twenty feet in thickness and that
the best pay streak is full two feet
of very rich chloride and ruby ore.

One block two feet long, one foot
wide and six inches thick, was
brought to Boise City by one of the
company. We are assured by Hon.
Thomas Hart who examined it, that
it was so tough with native metallic
silver, that it was chiseled out
square and true, and that no place
on it had sufficient rock of any kind
in it to cause it to break, but that
all uneven places and the sides
where it had been torn loose from
the adjacent lode leaving fibrous
silver on the surface, were so nearly
pure as to be hammered down
smooth after the manner of finish-
ing up a bar of assayed bullion.

The Supreme Court have decided so far
as the questions were submitted to them the
suit known as the Vincent-Larson case. This
suit involved the validity of a bond made by
Larson to Vincent. The real parties at interest
are W. E. Vincent, A. J. Cope and H.
Way on one side, and Peck & Porter on the
other. The property in dispute is known as
the Second South Extension of the Oro Fino
or as the defendants have named it the Peck
and Porter. The ground is immensely rich
and valuable. The following is the ruling of
the Court:

Wm Vincent, appellant, vs Thos. Larson,
respondent. Ordered, that both demurrers
interposed by defendant to plaintiff's com-
plaint, in the court below, be overruled, and
that said defendant Larson have thirty days
to answer on paying costs of appeal; provid-
ed, the court or judge of court below may
grant further time to answer on good cause
shown.

Company, Defendants:
IN THE NAME OF THE PEOPLE OF THE
United States, in the Territory of Idaho,
You are hereby notified that there is now on
file in the office of the Clerk of the District
Court of the Third Judicial District of said
Territory, in Silver City, Owyhee County, the
Complaint of the above named Plaintiff, pray-
ing judgment against the said Defendant, L.
J. Lewis, and for a Decree and for an Order
of the said Court, as follows: The above en-
titled action is brought to obtain a judgment
of this Court against the said Defendant,
L. J. Lewis, for the sum of \$31,240 00, a bal-
ance due and unpaid to said Plaintiff by said
Defendant, Lewis, of the purchase money,
\$46,240 00, for certain property sold and con-
veyed by said Plaintiff to said Def't, Lewis, with
costs of suit; and to obtain a Decree of said
Court establishing said Plaintiff's Lien as
Vendor of the said certain property, against
the said certain property and every part
thereof, and for an Order on the Sheriff of
said County for the sale of said property in
pursuance of law for the satisfaction of the
amount of said Judgment and costs; the said
certain property being described in Plaintiff's
