Commercial Club Meeting.

The meeting of the commercial club Wednesday night was an interesting one, several new members joining and many new suggestions looking to civic improvement being discussed. Twenty members attended, and during the session Mayor Lowe, John Adams, L. A. Critchfield, Cashier J. B. Randall, Senator Haight, S. P. Worthington, Prof. Mitchell, and others, spoke on the matter of creating the new road district passed upon some time ago; T. H. Farmer offered some pertinent matter for the club's consideration; Prof. Laney reported progress on the cabinet ordered by the club, and President McMurray commented on the new life with which the club was becoming endowed, and the prospect of an increased fund being soon available to enable club to proceed with its plans for the town's advancement.

It appears to the writer that, in the very necessary matter of street cleanliness, etc., as suggested by Mr. Farmer, lack of immediate fund of the club should not excuse dependence upon the action of the village board. Popular subscription should at least furnish sufficient fund to do that part of the work that is most urgent. A man has a very poor quality of local pride who will not disconnect himself from a dollar or two occasionally for the sole satisfaction of having his home town look well in the eyes of visiting strangers.

Humanity is ever selfish, and for that reason a man who will not live in a modest dwelling after he can afford a mansion, seems to take no thought of the fact that ill-kept streets, etc., with right-thinking people, reflect to a greater extent on him than on his poorer neighbor, besides deteriorating to a great extent

from the value of his property. The troubles with the majority of people, in Oakley as elsewhere, is that their enterprise will not stand the test of unselfishness from a communal standpoint. There is not a business man in Oakley who will not fall over himself to subscribe \$25 toward an improvement if you can prove to him that he will gain \$50 as a direct result, but, in Oakley as elsewhere, those who will subscribe any appreciable amount without hope or wish for any return in which their neighbors do not share are sadly in the minority.

By all means, try popular subscription for improvement that taxation will not warrant. We who are poor, and have no property value to enhance, nevertheless appreciate aesthetic environment sufficiently to be willing to do our share.
