But when the returns are all in and reported, the names will continue to spell Progress and Prosperity. It is only once in a long while that our country takes a step in the opposite direction.

### CAPITAL FOR IRRIGATION.

The Twin Falls News speaks of the ease with which capital is now being secured for the development of Idaho irrigation projects under the Carey act. The Twin Falls section is a present example of what can be done in the way of development by turning the heretofore undirected water of the streams upon the land. It is profitable to the capitalist and to the producer who buys the water. The News says:

Two powerful companies, the Buhl-Kimberly corporation and the Kuhn brothers of Pittsburg, are seeking the privilege of reclaiming a half million acres in Twin Falls and Owyhee counties, between the Salmon and Bruneau rivers. It is singular that such competition should have been made possible by the very men who are engaged in it. Until recently it was a difficult task to interest capital in Idaho irriga-

tion enterprises. The government reclamation service maintained a continuous campaign against private enterprise in this state, using its press bureau in the unscrupulous work. The service stands today beaten and discredited in this part of the country while private enterprise is forging ahead and performing wonders. The Twin Falls project has given the lie to the reclamation defamers and has convinced capital of the practicability of the Carey act and the immense advantages in its operation over that of the tape-swaddled and crab-like reclamation law. Capital is glad to invest in Idaho irrigation securities now. It clamors for the opportunity. It was a hard fought battle and the honors belong to Twin Falls, the biggest and best irrigation enterprise in America and the target for all the jealous parasites in the country.

### BE SEATED, MR. DUBOIS.

Dubois' delegation was seated at Denver and the so-called rump delegation was turned down—which will make the feeling at Wallace all the more cordial.

This means that Hawley who was chairman of the Idaho state democracy long before Dubois became a democrat is not considered good enough to associate with the Bryan push. Hawley has served the party faithfully for a lifetime, and has frequently accepted the forlorn-hope nomination for congressional delegate, governor, etc., when nobody else would have it. For more than 30 years he has given of his strength, mentally, physically and financially, for party advancement, and his reward is the husks of the feast.

Every man, by the mere purchase of the things he needs, is a factor in putting another man to work, and generous buying is the result of confidence, which brings to us the fact that confidence is what keeps the wheels of industry going at top speed.

Whether there be confidence or not men must live and by living give impetus to the wheels, but they will move slowly when only necessity pushes, while confidence, which

brings the desire for luxuries and comfort, sends the wheels spinning with the merry whirl of busy content.

And back of the confidence which does these things is the man and the issues which inspire it, the certainty that the policy of a "square deal" will be carried on, and that every man so far as government can give it to him, will have a fair chance to realize, according to his ability, the benefits of his industry.


