PLANS CONSTRUCTION OF TRACTION BUILDING

Caldwell Traction Co. to Erect Two-Story Cement Structure at Corner Seventh and Arthur Streets.

Caldwell, Jan. 15.—Among the business buildings to be constructed in this city in the near future is a large two-story cement brick building at the corner of Arthur and Seventh streets, as a depot building for the Caldwell Traction company.

The building will have a floor space of 50x75 feet, with the first floor 18 feet between the floor and the ceiling and a full basement. The waiting room is to be 2x3 1/2 feet in area, and over it and in front on a mezzanine floor will be located the private offices of the company.

The remainder of the building will consist of two rooms, one 26x75 feet with an opening on Seventh avenue for a storage room, and the other with an opening on Arthur street, which will be rented.

SEES GREAT FUTURE IN LAND NEAR BOISE

Oregon Editor Gives Impressions of Agricultural Section North of Eagle.

E. L. Boede, editor of the Pioneer Sun, published at Drewsey, Ore., received an agricultural eye opener last week while visiting relatives west of Eagle. In commenting upon the richness of the agricultural section which he visited and its possibilities, he writes editorially as follows: "The editor of the Sun last week visited relatives and friends at the home of William Hopwood and wife in Boise county, Idaho, situated about 14 miles west of Eagle, on the inter-urban line of railroad. Upon investigation we found this locality, which is 20 miles from Boise, the capital of the great state of Idaho, to be similar to the notable wheat belt of Pendleton, Ore. Its topography, soil and climatic conditions will justify that city's thorough investigation if it is interested in its commercial growth as it holds out great promise in those directions.

Thousands of acres of these rich agricultural lands are depleted of development from the state's lease law, which brings only 10 cents per acre for grazing purposes, while the law allows 50 cents per acre for agricultural purposes. Under this situation the state is being cheated in two important ways, viz. in greater production of cereals, fruits, vegetables, hogs and dairying, and 40 cents per acre."
