

LANE HAS PLANS FOR RECLAIMING THE IDLE LANDS

State Council of Defense Is Informed That He Asks Congress for Hundred Million Dollars.

TWO DAYS' COST OF WAR

Nothing Stands in Way of Proceeding With Plans Except Appropriation All of Which Will Be Returned.

The appropriation of a sum equal to but two days' cost of the great war will reclaim and make productive thousands of farm homes in this country in many states, including Idaho, for returning soldiers.

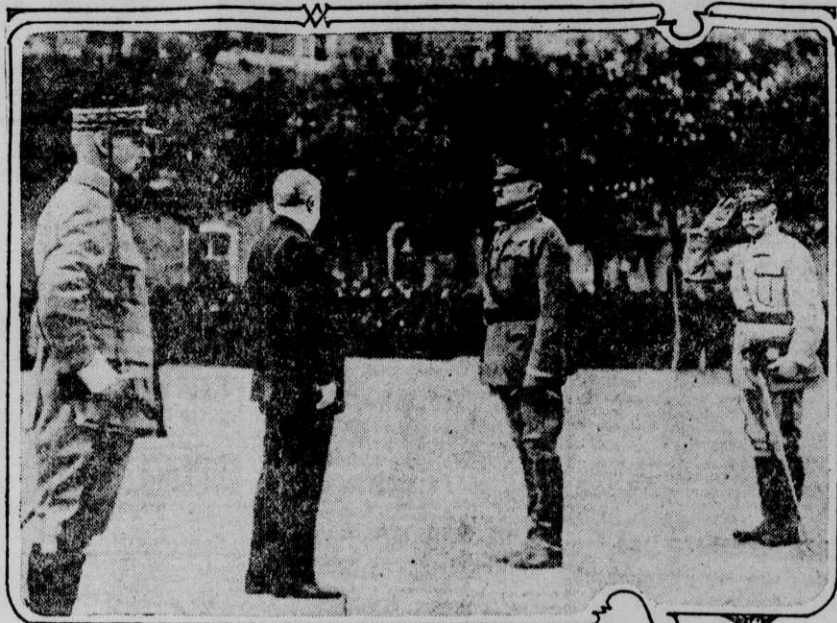
STATEMENT RECEIVED.

WAR BANS FAIL TO CURB U. S. EXPORTS

Decrease for 1918 of Only \$83,000,000 From Record 1917 Year; Imports Show Gain of \$79,000,000 Over Last Year.

Washington, Jan. 22.—In spite of drastic export regulations, due to the war, the total exports for the United States in 1918 showed a decrease of only \$83,000,000 as compared with 1917.

Exports for December, the first full month after the signing of the armistice, aggregated \$566,000,000. This figure is \$44,900,000 higher than that of November.

U. S. LABOR TEACHES EUROPE NEW POLICY

Union Leaders Seek to Discourage Political Agitation as Class Measure; Aliens Introduced to Doctrine of "Pep."

New York, Jan. 22.—American labor influences are at work attempting to discourage political agitation as a class measure by European labor leaders and to impress upon Europe's working men that the way to earn more money is to produce more goods.

This is a startling doctrine for Europe, where leisure is highly prized and speed in production is strictly limited by trades unions. "Pep" is a new word to Europeans, which America is now trying to introduce to them.

The European labor leaders who want the state to act for them in attaining greater economic comfort are planning to hold a congress in Switzerland under Socialist auspices. The Americans have declined to attend this convention.

RUSSIAN WRITER DEAD.

Los Angeles, Cal., Jan. 22.—Captain Peter Demons, Russian writer, who is said to have contributed much to the overthrow of the Romanoffs through his work in allied countries, is dead here today.

CITY WELL BEHAVED ACCORDING TO SMALL NUMBER ARRESTS MADE

OCEAN RATES' REDUCTION TO AID U. S. EXPORTERS

Washington, Jan. 22.—American exporters will soon be able to compete successfully with foreign manufacturers as a result of a new shipping board policy in respect to ocean rates.

PLAN BILL TO TURN BACK WIRES TO PRIVATE HANDS

Washington, Jan. 22.—A resolution for immediate repeal of government wire control may be brought into the house in the next few days.

HOPS HIT RECORD PRICE.

Portland, Ore., Jan. 22.—Notwithstanding the fact that prohibition is scheduled for the United States, the highest price ever paid for hops is on record here today.

Nine thousand bales of Oregon hops sold yesterday for \$509,000, at the rate of 25 cents a pound. The contract is for delivery of 3000 bales a year for three years.

PADEREWSKI ASKS RECOGNITION.

Warsaw, Jan. 22.—Ignace Paderewski, president of the new Polish republic, having completed formation of the cabinet, has sent a note to the allies requesting recognition of the provisional government of Poland as one of the allies.

SUPER LINERS CARRY 6468 YANKEES HOME

Transport Cretic Docks at New York With 1911 Aboard; Manchuria in Port, Laden With 4557 Overseas Troops.

New York, Jan. 22.—The transport Cretic from Brest arrived here today with 1911 men, and the Manchuria from St. Nazaire with 4557 men.

The Manchuria's list includes the 87th division headquarters company, detachments of the 312th sanitary train, 39th division, 301st trench mortar battery, seventh heavy mortar ordnance repair shop from Camp Merritt, 466th engineers' pontoon train, 97th aero squadron, 154th aero squadron from Fort Slocum, 2d casual ordnance battalion, parts from Camp Utton, Camp Dix and Camp Merritt, casual companies 126, 127 and 128, and sick and wounded.

FOR EARLY CONVOY.

Washington, Jan. 22.—Assignment to early convoy was announced by the war department today with respect to the following organizations:

Ninetieth and 104th aero squadrons. Thirtieth company transport corps. First and second casual company, transportation corps, and the following replacement and salvage companies of the 333d battalion: 376, 377, 378, 379, 380 and 381.

Three hundred and fourth battalion with the 307th, 318th, 325d, 336th, 337th replacement and salvage companies.

Casual companies A, B and C, October automatic replacement draft; 393rd center tank company unit; cement mill companies 2, 4 and 6; quartermaster casual company 3, 17th and 18th balloon companies, 199th field signal battalions, 464th pontoon train, 407th telegraph battalion, 58th regiment coast artillery, less third battalion and base hospital 24.

are considering the possibility of finding homes elsewhere.

Italy's population actually increased as a result of the war. Normal emigration was dummed up while hundreds of thousands of men returned home to fight.

LONG FOR HOMELANDS.

"The movement of peoples is not solely westward, however. Hundreds of thousands of Europeans, for one reason or another, returned from America to their homes each year. The war stopped this ebb, particularly for citizens of neutral countries. Multiply this annual emigration by four and you have a vast army waiting impatiently in America for an opportunity to go back to their homelands.

Many of these are dissatisfied with their position in American society, where they are regarded as menials. They expect to return home and buy farms and become important and respected citizens. Instances of this attitude are not isolated, but general.

There is also a widespread resentment among the immigrants from neutral countries over what they consider America's rough shod treatment of them in war time. This provides the incentive for many to return home.

There is no doubt that many European nations are considering legislation for restriction of emigration, hoping to keep their people at home. On the other hand, America and other lands of promise doubtless will have up barriers, especially since they desire to protect the interests of their returning soldiers.
