WEISER PHYSICIAN GOES TO ARMENIA IN HOSPITAL SERVICE

Dr. S. B. Dudley to Sail From New York in Few Days to Help Save Armenian Sufferers.

IDAHO ASKED FOR \$75,000

American Relief Committee Is Establishing Hospitals and Raising \$30,000,000 for the Work.

Word has been received by State Director Robert M. McCracken, who is handling the drive in Idaho for funds for Armenian and Syrian relief, that Dr. S. B. Dudley, a prominent physician and surgeon of Waisen, has been assigned to hospital service in the relief work being carried on in the near east and will sail from New York for Asiatic Turkey within a few days.

Dr. Dudley, who is well known in western Idaho, was called to New York early in January by the American committee for relief in the near east and has been engaged in securing medical recruits and assembling surgical and other equipment for 15 hospitals which are to be established in Armenia for the refugees and exiles driven from their homes by the Turkish government.

TRYING TO SAVE CHRISTIANS.

The American committee for relief of starving Armenians is making a desperate effort to save at least a remnant of the Christian population of Turkey. Food, clothing and medicines are being rushed to them as rapidly as funds are available for their purchase. It is estimated more than 400,000 children, most of them orphaned, are sick and starving at this time on the deserts

ONLY WESTERN MAN CALLED.

The American committee is now raising a fund of \$20,000,000 to carry on this relief work. Idaho's quota is \$75,000 and most of this has been accounted for, although the campaign is still continuing in counties that have not raised their allotments.

Dr. Dudley has accepted service with the Armenian and Syrian relief work for a year and will have charge of the hospitals he has been outfitting. He is the only western physician and surgeon called into this service and the high position in which he is placed is a fine tribute to the medical and surgical fraternity of Idaho.

It will interest Idaho people who are active in helping in the Armenian relief work to know that an Idaho man will head the hospital service and under which the funds raised in this state will be expended for the helpless victims of Turkish brutality in the near east.

SOLDIERS TO FORM ORGANIZATION HERE

Service Men With at Least Six Months in Army to Meet at Commercial Club Monday Evening to Confer.

Every man in the city of Boise or near vicinity who has seen at least six months in the service of the United States army, either in this country or abroad, is requested to attend a meeting to be held at the Boise Commercial club the evening of January 27 at 8 o'clock, for the purpose of forming an organization to be called the Allied Army War Veterans.

A large number of men have entered the army from Ada county, Boise city and immediate vicinity, and it is the aim of the new organization to bring these men in close touch with each other, to keep up old associations, to assist each other in future projects undertaken in civil life, and generally to promote the civic, social and business life of the men from this section who went in the land forces of Uncle Sam during the war with Germany.

It is the desired of the discharged men in this city who are endeavoring to form the organization in a permanent manner to get the men closely allied and working together in an institution that will be helpful to the men in many ways, as many matters of importance are constantly arising in connection with the return to civil life of the men that demand close attention and solidarity by the men themselves. It is also felt that such an organization would be of great benefit socially, and it is planned to secure club rooms in the city and fit them up in a way that will be permanent.

DENY CHANGE OF VENUE IN DIVORCE SUIT WHERE PROPERTY IS INVOLVED

Property to the value of \$20,000 is involved in the divorce case of Grover C. Corder against Anna J. Corder in which Judge Redloch today denied the defendant's motion for a change of venue from Ada to Elmore counties.
