BALES BROTHERS WILL ERECT BIG WAREHOUSE

Work on Cement Structure, Estimated to Cost \$50,000, Begins Monday at Caldwell; Planned as Storage House for Farmers.

Caldwell, Jan. 30.—The construction of a two-story cement warehouse at the intersection of Seventh and Albany streets, which it is estimated will cost \$50,000 will be commenced in this city next Monday morning by the Bales Brothers.

Another building of similar proportions and also of cement structure is to be erected on the lot west of the lot of the Bales warehouse by the J. L. Hardsy Implement company. It will be a one story with a full basement and is to have an area of 100 feet by 150 feet. In addition to this extensive building activity the board of education contemplate the completion of the high school at an approximate expenditure of \$75,000. This work will probably be commenced the latter part of March.

An immense grain elevator is also to be erected during the early spring at a cost of \$100,000 by the B. M. Holt Seed and Feed company and the construction of all these buildings with the paving of Kimball avenue, which is to be done by the city in the immediate future at a probable expenditure of \$50,000 passage for the city the most active year in its entire history.


