

SEASONABLE RECIPES.

Whip Syllabub.—1 pint of cream, sifted white sugar to taste, 1/2 tumbler of white wine, the grated rind and juice of a lemon; beat all to a froth.

Wafer Crackers.—1 pound of flour, 1 teaspoonful of salt, 1/2 teaspoonful of soda, even teaspoonful of lard. Make up with sweet milk; beat well, roll thin and bake quick.

Baked Custards.—1 pint of cream; 4 eggs; cinnamon; almond-flavor, and 3 ounces of sugar. Boil the cream with a piece of cinnamon; pour it into a basin, and when cold add the eggs, well beaten and strained, the sugar powdered, and a few drops of almond-flavor. Bake in small cups, in a cool oven.

Slicer Cake.—1 cup of sugar, 1/2 cup of butter, 1 1/2 cups of flour, 1/2 cup of milk, 1/2 teaspoonful soda, 1 teaspoonful cream-of-tartar, whites of 4 eggs; beat the butter and eggs to a cream, then add the milk and flour with the soda and cream-of-tartar; whisk the whites of the eggs to a froth, and stir them in gently at the last. Flavor with lemon.

Pearled Wheat.—This should come clean enough not to need looking over, though it is well to make sure that it is so. Add 4 parts water to 1 of wheat, and cook 3 or more hours. A double boiler or one kettle set in another is very desirable in cooking this, because the starch is more likely to cook out and burn to the kettle. This may be eaten warm, as a mush or a vegetable, or molded and served cold, with or without trimmings.

Apple Bread.—Weigh 1 pound of fresh, juicy apples, peel, core, and stew them to a pulp, being careful to use a porcelain kettle or stone jar, placed inside an ordinary saucepan of boiling water; otherwise their fruit will become discolored; mix the pulp with 2 pounds of the best flour; put in the same quantity of yeast you would use for common bread, and as much water as will make it fine, smooth dough; put into an iron pan and place in a warm place to rise, and let it remain for twelve hours at least. Form it into long-shaped loaves and bake in a quick oven.

A French Soup.—A sheep's head and pluck to a gallon of water, boil gently till reduced to half the quantity, with a small teaspoonful of pearl barley, 6 large onions, 1 carrot, and 1 turnip, a bunch of sweet herbs, and a few cloves; season it to your taste, add a little catsup, thicken with flour and butter. The head must be cleaned and boiled the day before it is used; cut the meat off as you would for calf's head, in small pieces; add egg and forcemeat balls, and a little white wine.

French Pancake.—2 eggs, 2 ounces of butter, 2 ounces of sifted sugar, 2 ounces of flour, 1/2 pint of new milk. Beat the eggs thoroughly, and put them into a basin with the butter, which should be beaten to a cream; stir in the sugar and flour, and when these ingredients are well mixed, add the milk; keep stirring and beating the mixture for a few minutes; put it on buttered plates, and bake in a quick oven for twenty minutes. Serve with a cut lemon and sugar, and pile the pancakes high on a dish, with a layer of preserve or marmalade between each.

A Horrible Suicide.

One of the most shocking cases of suicide ever reported in this city, says the New York Herald, occurred yesterday morning in a machine shop, at No. 163 Bank Street. About 10:30 o'clock James McCulloch, a plumber, working in the American Fire-Escape Works, corner of Bank and West Streets, went into the machine-shop, or, more properly speaking, steam-power establishment, at the number above stated, which adjoins the Fire-Escape Works, and requested of the foreman, Mr. John Frisbie, to be allowed to sharpen a lead-scraper. The privilege was accorded him, and he proceeded to carry out his design, not, however, until Frisbie had noticed a number of peculiar and somewhat idiotic movements on his part. About fifteen or twenty minutes later all hands about the establishment were surprised at the sudden stopping of the machinery. The engineer, Frederick Randolph, at once proceeded to examine his engine, trying all the valves, stop-cocks, etc., and spending from twenty-five to thirty minutes in the operation, but failing utterly to ascertain the cause of the interruption. Finally, however, he went forward to the large cogwheel which revolves the main shaft, and after peering about a few minutes was horrified at discovering a human head lying on the floor beside the wheel. He called for assistance, and having procured proper lights prosecuted the search, only to find that the body of a man, crushed between the cogs, had caused the sudden interruption of business.

A most sickening sight was now brought to view. With the exception of the head and the legs, from the knee joint down, there was nothing recognizable. Pieces of flesh and bones, varying in size, but none of them larger than a man's hand; intestines and masses of blood were scattered in a confused manner about the floor, the machinery and surrounding fence. It was found impossible to collect the pieces by hand, and the aid of brooms and shovels had to be invoked, the whole conglomerate mass being thrown into a box and subsequently removed to the Morgue.

During the excitement attending the horrible affair no one could, for a time, ascertain who the unfortunate man was, but Mr. Frisbie soon remembered the fact of the man McCulloch, before alluded to, having entered the shop some time before, and then all was clear. That the man was laboring under a temporary fit of insanity there can be no question, and that while in this condition he threw himself between the wheels is equally clear. All his actions about the establishment, just previous to his death, were those of an insane man. The large cogwheel is sixteen feet in diameter, and is about fourteen inches wide. This, as above stated, operates the main shaft which runs through into other buildings where steam-power is let for planing and other purposes. Attached to the cogwheel is a monster fly wheel, twenty feet in diameter and weighing not less than eight tons. Around this portion of the machinery is built a board fence, four feet high, through which a door or gate opens. This door is invariably kept closed and fastened with a "button," but neither the engineer or foreman are positive as to whether it was closed or not when search for the cause of the stoppage of the machinery was instigated.

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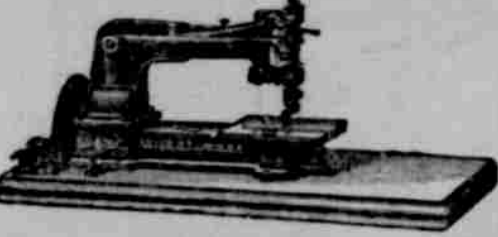
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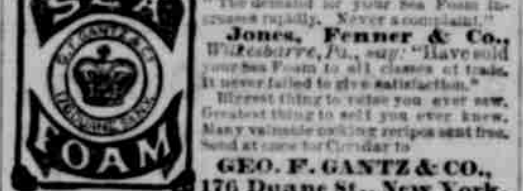
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
