## Democratic Meeting.

At a meeting of the Democracy of Dubois county, held at the Court House in the town of Jasper, on the 8th day of February, 1858 for the purpose of selecting a County Central Committee, on motion Col. Thos. Shoulders was called to the Chair, and John Mehninger chosen Secretary.

The Chairman, in a short address, stated the object of the meeting.

On motion, a committee of one from each township was appointed to report to the meeting a Central Committee.

The following gentlemen were appointed:  
From Patoka—Thomas Simons.  
Hall—J. Jacob Allis.  
Columbia—Harvey Nicholson.  
Bainbridge—Jacob Herman.  
Ferdinand—John G. Gohman.  
Harbison—A. Able.  
Harvey Nicholson, of Columbia township, not being present, Philip Conrad was appointed to fill the vacancy.

The above committee, after consultation reported that they had selected the following persons to act as a County Central Committee, for the ensuing year:  
From Patoka Township—Andrew B. Spradley, Henry Bruner and Martin E. Meyers.

Bainbridge—Jacob Herman, B. B. Edmonston, and John Mehninger.

Harbison—Thomas P. Hope, Andrew Able, and Samuel White.

Columbia—R. M. Davis, Leroy Cave and Harvey Nicholson.

Hall—Thomas Shoulders, Joseph Strigle and Jacob Allis.

Ferdinand—John B. Gohman, Fred. Neideck, and D. M. Kemp.

On motion the report was unanimously adopted.

W. F. Parrot, Esq., from Boonville, was then introduced by the chair, and made an excellent address.

James Shanklin, Esq., of Evansville, also addressed the meeting in an eloquent and spirited manner.

The following resolutions were then offered by Mr. Doane, and on motion, were unanimously adopted:  
**Resolved,** That the Democracy of Dubois county are still in favor of the glorious doctrine of popular sovereignty, as declared by our revolutionary fathers in the Declaration of Independence, and on which James Buchanan was so triumphantly elected; and that Kansas, or no other Territory, ought to be admitted into the Union as a State without the people thereof first having an opportunity of voting on the whole of their Constitution, and their being an undoubted majority in its favor.

**Resolved,** That we are in favor of specie circulating instead of being locked up in the vaults of banks; and opposed to a rag currency in all or any of its forms.

**Resolved,** That we are opposed to any increase of the State debt, to oppress the people; and we sustain the action of the last Legislature in regard to the Wabash and Erie Canal.

**Resolved,** That we heartily endorse the Platform adopted by the State Convention on the 8th of January, and that the ticket there nominated will receive our cordial and unqualified support.

On motion of John Mehninger the proceedings of this meeting were ordered to be published.
