Month's Arrests

On charges ranging from murder to violating the Volstead Act, 192 arrests were made by the East Chicago and Indiana Harbor police departments during the month of November.

The most attracting figure on the classified report of Chief of Police Struss last month is the number of violations of the state liquor law. Only 13 arrests were made for this crime during November which is usually a hundred or more for a corresponding period.

Of the total arrests, 125 were found guilty and 24 not guilty. Other disposition was made of the remaining 33 cases. Eighty-eight paid fines, aggregating a total of \$2,252. Stolen property recovered amounted to \$5,350.

MUNCIE, Dec. 5.—A circuit court jury this week will decide the legitimacy of a claim for \$10,000 filed by the parents of Carl Garard, one of four Muncie young men killed in a crossing accident June 29, when their automobile was struck by a train.

The contention in the suit is whether or not the crossing watchman and the engineer gave the proper signals. Three other like suits, filed by relatives of the other victims, are pending.

MELLON AGAINST EXTRA TAXATION

Secretary of Treasury Makes His Annual Report Today.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—Undaunted by the expected deficit this year in government revenues, Secretary of the Treasury Andrew W. Mellon in his annual report to congress today declared the country should not be subjected to additional taxation.

Instead of recommending new taxation to make up the deficit, Secretary Mellon advocated the lowering of surtax rates on large incomes from the present 50 per cent to 25 per cent, contending this action would result in capital being drawn from its hiding places and put to productive work, thus creating new tax sources naturally.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

The winter boxing season presents interesting possibilities in the way of matches if promoters and boxers will forget their high finance ideas and get down to the business of making matches.

There seems a little likelihood of a bout between Jack Dempsey and Harry Wills, leading negro heavy, believed by many experts to be able to give Dempsey a battle. Aside from the proposed international bout between Joe Beckett and Dempsey, Tom Gibbons battle seems about the best bet. A bout between Bill Brennan and Floyd Johnson may materialize. Watching the rise of a promising heavyweight is the most interesting thing in boxing. Johnson seems to be a real contender, but he has a reputation for being a victory over him would enhance Johnson's standing to no small extent.

In the light heavyweight class a Gene Tunney-Harry Greb match is the best that can be arranged. These men are bound to come together in the near future and it will be one of the big bouts of the winter. Those who backed Tunney when he lost the title to Greb will back him again to a man. They are convinced that he would have beaten Greb if he had received fair treatment from the referee, who allowed Greb to transgress the rules all the way.

Tunney and Gibbons could pack any indoor club. Tunney declares that he is willing to meet Gibbons as soon as he wins back his title from Greb. Both Tunney and Gibbons are high class men in every way. They are crack boxers, and good hitters. A match between them ought to be worth while.

Greb and Gibbons over again another match that would draw well. Greb made Gibbons look rather cheap the last time they met. There is no question Gibbons has enough "tuff" to beat Greb. Whether he has courage enough to make use of it is another matter. Little Greb's victory over Gibbons is a dark blot on Tom's record and if he is made of the right stuff he will try to remove it before going after the match with Dempsey.

Mickey Walker, the new welterweight champion, can be used with a dozen opponents all of whom figure to give him a great scrap. If Walker cares to fight he can box here at least once every two months for a long time to come unless he loses his title.

Benny Leonard would be the best opponent for Walker. This match looks so promising that it will be put on until next summer. Leonard and Tender over again is another bout that is too big for an indoor arena. It also will be staged next summer, although neither of the men may be in the lightweight class by that time.

Leonard is matched to box Charley White in New York this winter. The promoter did well when he selected White, who appears to be the most dangerous of the lightweight contenders, barring Tender, of course.

Johnny Kilbane and Johnny Dundee would draw plenty of money if they could be brought together, but it is apparent that Kilbane does not intend to fight again.

Joe Lynch and Pancho Villa in a match for the bantam title would be a great attraction.

Keene Fitzpatrick, Princeton track coach, football trainer, and athletic adviser, is entering his thirty-third year in point of service and thirteen at Princeton. Fitzpatrick started at Ann Arbor in 1890, where, with Yost he helped put the Wolverines on the football map.
