## DEPARTMENT OF WAR TO DECIDE ON ELIGIBILITY COMMITTEE TO GET DEFINITE RULING ON FRESHMAN AND SCHEDULE MIXUPS.

The machinery governing football and other sports of the Big Ten colleges yesterday was formally tendered to the War Department for the period of the war at a special meeting of the faculty athletic representatives of the schools at the Congress Hotel.

Since every student eligible for the various teams will be enrolled in a student army training camp, and therefore amenable to the War Department jurisdiction, the professor naturally argued that there could be no intercollegiate competition or athletic of any kind without the consent and sanction of Uncle Sam, and to learn in more detail the government's desires regarding college sports the Big Ten delegates further named a committee of two to go to Washington and acquaint itself minutely in this respect.

Prof. Thomas E. French, Ohio State, and Avery Brundage, Chicago, representing respectively the Big Ten faculty athletic board and the committee of graduate managers, were appointed to make the trip to the War Department's office and obtain a clear understanding of Uncle Sam's plans.

## FRIEDMAN AND CARL DELANEY FIGHT A DRAW

ROCK ISLAND, Ill., Sept. 26.—Jackie Carl Delaney of Great Lakes and Salgar Friedman of Chicago, fought ten fast and furious rounds to a good draw here tonight.

The Jackie got home-telling hooks to Friedman's midsection. The first and seventh rounds went to Friedman, while Delaney's strongest rounds were the sixth and ninth. The referee cautioned Delaney repeatedly for rough work with his head. Friedman in the ninth claimed a foul, sinking to the canvas holding his groin. He arose and made a savage rally.

## WEEK-END BALL LEAGUE FORMED

### Chicago in Eight-Club Circuit That Will Play Saturday-Sunday Games.

CLEVELAND, Sept. 27.—Chicago, Detroit, Cleveland, Pittsburgh, Cincinnati and Akron were today selected by the executive committee of the National Baseball Federation as cities to be represented in an eight-city league to play semi-professional baseball in major league parks Saturdays and Sundays next season. The remaining two cities will be chosen from Louisville, Indianapolis, Johnston, Pa., and Canton and Dayton, Ohio.

Each city in the league will have at least two clubs, one remaining at home while the other is on the road. The receipts will be divided in three ways. The traveling expenses of the clubs will be paid first and then the upkeep of the parks. The remainder will go to the National Commission on Training Camp Activities for athletic equipment for soldiers and sailors.

A committee of three was appointed to go to Washington and confer with government officials regarding railroad facilities permitting the transportation of split teams of fifteen men each. The committee will report at the annual meeting of the federation in January.

A major official will be appointed head of the league.

## PACKEY HAS A SHADE OVER DYER IN BOUT

CAMP GRANT, Ill., Sept. 27.—Camp Grant and Camp Taylor met at the boxing arena here tonight with honors even. Freddie Enock, Camp Grant, lightweight, won from Magolis of Taylor, in a fast bout, and Metrie of Taylor walked shabby of Grant in the welterweight scrum. The other bouts resulted in a draw.

Clarence Rowland, manager of the White Sox, refereed. Packey McFarland, boxing instructor at Taylor, showed his old-time form in his three rounds with Fred Dyer, Grant instructor. Packey and Dyer paraded with his famous shift and landed a number of heavy blows. Dyer showed plenty

of fight, but was no match for Packey. Miller of Grant and Sergeant Ivan Candler of Taylor staged a fast mid-weight bout which the crowd thought was Miller's. Rowland called it a draw. Candler was clever and showed some McFarland tricks, but Miller was aggressive and carried the fight to his opponent.

Edward of Grant and Ross of Taylor fought a fast light heavyweight draw. Mason of Taylor and Bennett (Frank Taylor) of Grant fought a fast draw in the bantamweight bout. Sammy Sandow of Taylor and Sgt. Harry Althoff of Grant, also fought a draw in the lightweight class.

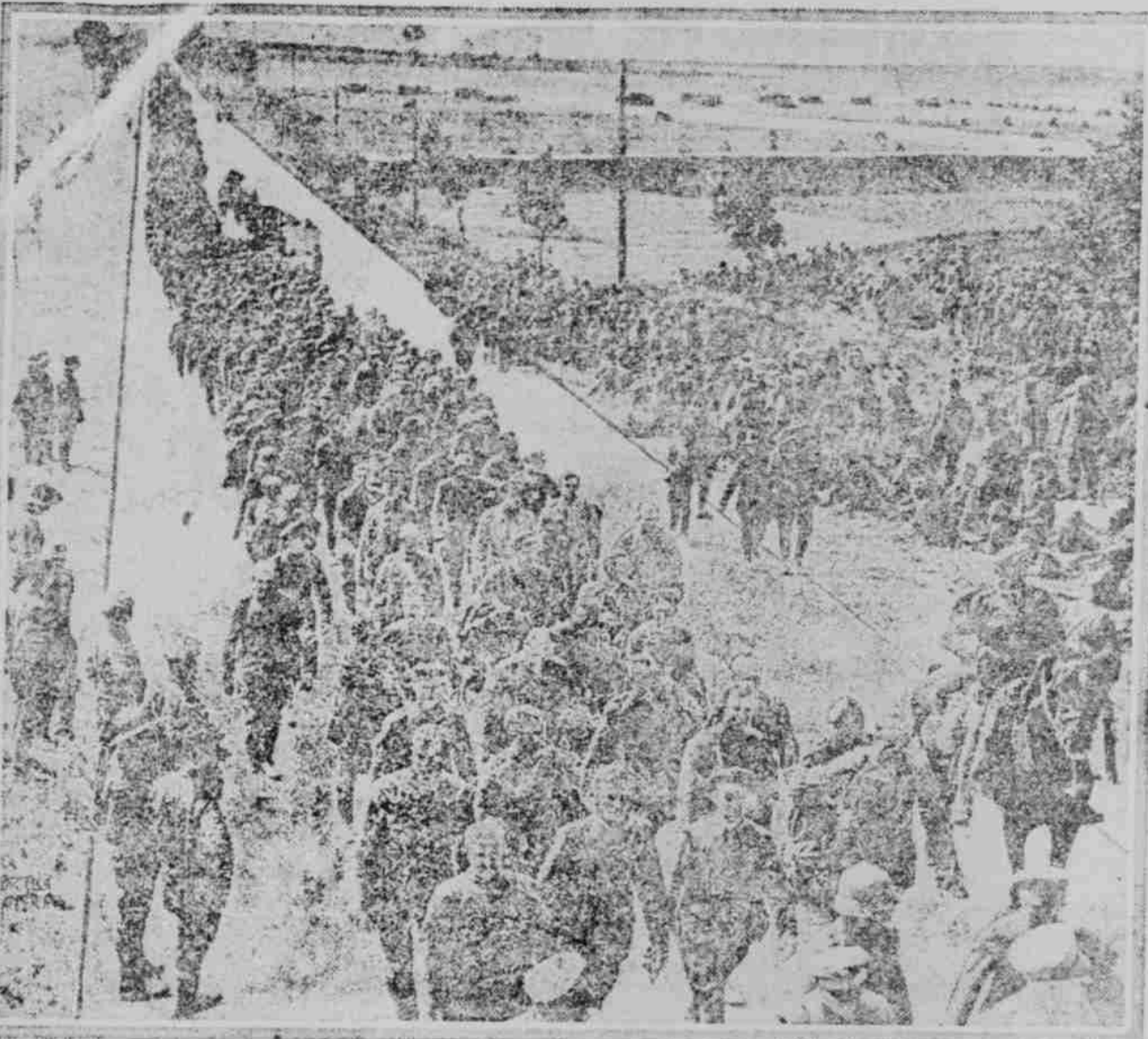

bers must save coal. Clean your furnaces and stoves, keep them in repair and study economical firing. Don't overheat the premises. The cold weather isn't here yet, but it is proper to have the heating plants and the good resolutions all tuned up in advance.

How many teaspoons in one pound of sugar? If the spoon is just level full, about 95 to the pound. If you are trying to limit table consumption to one pound a month, you could use three of these skimpy spoonfuls each day. The rounded spoonful runs about 45 to the pound or one and a half daily. The heaping spoonful averages about 32 to the pound. That would be one a day. If you are heaping the spoon more than once a day you are using some other fellow's sugar.

## DANIELS ON POOR FIGHTERS

INDIANAPOLIS, IND., Sept. 26.—Secretary of the Navy Josephus Daniels visited Soldiers' Recreation House No. 1 of the War Camp Community Service here recently. He was much impressed by the work which this organization is carrying on for the Commission on Training Camp Activities of the War and Navy departments, as exemplified in this house, and said:

"It is a great work that the War Camp Community Service is doing, and I wish that every mother with a boy in the service could visit your wonderful club-houses and see how the good people of the camp cities are working to give the men in uniform a home away from home. The exceedingly high moral condition of the navy and army, both at home and abroad, is the most convincing argument or testimonial of the practicality of the work being done by you and other civilian agencies."

"A homesick boy makes a poor fighter, and his depression cannot fail to lower the morale of his comrades. The work which your organization is accomplishing, therefore, not only promotes the welfare of the individual soldier, but constitutes a vital part in building up the government's great war machine."

"A recent investigation of the causes of desertion among young soldiers, made in the east, discloses the fact that in over 1,500 cases the young soldier had been led to quit the service because he was homesick. Just the desire to see the old folks and return to the scenes they knew and loved induced these young men, after all, 'are only boys grown tall,' to leave the army and risk severe punishment."
