The Conventions at Otwell.

For Representative, Dr. Peter L. Coble.  
For Prosecutor, Leo. H. Fisher.

Settled on the First Ballot.

By a telephone from Otwell yesterday to the COURIER it learns that Dr. Coble was nominated for Representative by acclamation, there being no opposition.  
For Prosecuting Attorney of the 57th Judicial Circuit, Leo H. Fisher and George Ashby were opponents, and quite a lively discussion resulted. The first ballot, however, resulted in Fisher's nomination by a vote of 15 for Fisher to 13 for Ashby.  
The nominees will be elected in November by a large majority.

Fifteen or twenty ladies and gentlemen of Jasper attended the Huntington High school commencement last Friday night, and represent it as a great success every way. If Jasper had a Supt. of the ability of Prof. Wortham, the patrons would feel grateful, and the schools would be benefitted.

The report of the Dubois County State Bank in this paper shows it to be in a healthful condition—the assets having increased about \$22,000 in the last three months. The long time six per cent. and five per cent. loans of the Building Associations and School Funds, upon mortgage security, have also enabled many debtors to the Bank to change the form of their indebtedness from a short time to a long running note, avoiding the trouble of frequent renewals.

By a vote of 433 to 233, the M. E. conference abolished the time limit on pastorates, thus finally disposing of one of the most important questions before the great Methodist body, and doing away with the fundamental feature of the itinerant system of the denomination. Hereafter, according to the amendment to the discipline adopted, preachers will be appointed annually by the Bishops, with no limit on the number of years a pastor may serve one congregation, except the limit imposed by his own ability and popularity with his congregation.

The golden time for a town to secure additional factories is now, when many in the gas belt are seeking other locations. But if Jasper secures any its citizens will have to unite in hustling for it, as other towns do, and there must be some persons authorized to look for opportunities.

For an abundance of steam coal, and many other patent natural substances for large industries, the location is unsurpassed, and one more factory as large as our present desk and lumber factories, would bring enough addition to the business of the town to secure another railroad outlet. Would it not be well for business men to get together and appoint a committee?

Commissioner's court at the Auditor's office next Monday.

The case of the State vs. John Singer and three others, of Cass township, indicted for disturbing a school celebration at the close of a district school in Cass township, occupied a good part of Tuesday at court. There were 65 witnesses subpoenaed in it, and the railroad held the afternoon train till court adjourned to accommodate them in getting home. They had to come back again on Wednesday.

PREMATURE BIRTH.—Mrs. Maggie Stamm, who was married to Christian Stamm last December, went before the grand jury in April and had him indicted for A. & B., and went to her father's, Mr. Adam Arnold, of Harbison township, to stay. Christian's trial was set for Wednesday, and Mrs. Stamm walked in the twelve miles to appear as a witness against him. She stopped at Mrs. Nordeck's boarding house in Jasper, but the walk was too much for her, and she was taken sick. Drs. Kempf and Salb were called and she gave birth to twins, at five months, a boy and a girl. One of them was alive at birth but died soon after, and were both neatly dressed by some sympathizing ladies, and put in one coffin, which was trimmed with white roses, and they were buried Thursday. Mrs. Stamm is resting easily, and it is thought will recover. This was her second marriage, she having been married first to Mr. John Loudner.

Stamm's trial was necessarily continued until next term of court.

Dubois Circuit Court

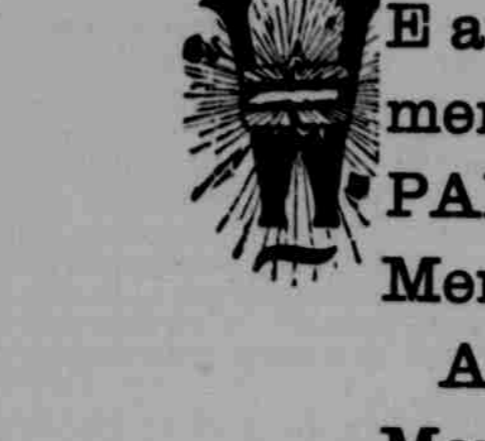

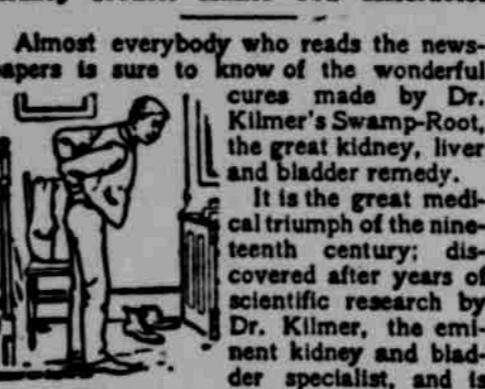
