

MYSTERY DEEPENS HOURLY ABOUT THE MURDER OF ALICE CRISPELL, WHO WAS LAST SEEN IN NIGHT OF REVELRY

WILKESBARRE, Pa., July 17.—“I took my gun from the shelf and pointed it at my daughter. It would be better that the bullet in this gun should pierce your heart than that you should sell your soul to the devil,” I told her.”

Such was the warning William Crispell, Wilkesbarre, Pa., gave his daughter Alice, whose body was taken from Harvey's lake on July 7, when he realized she was following that will-o'-the-wisp—the light that shines from cafe windows.

Herbert Johns, sweetheart of the drowned girl, has just been released, after a coroner's jury had exonerated him.

Alice Crispell was last seen alive July 4, and Johns was the last person seen with her. He says they spent the evening in dancing and then parted. He has declared he does not know how she came to her death.

William Crispell, the father, is a religious enthusiast, following his conversion by Billy Sunday. In a remarkable statement, he lays his daughter's death at the door of bad companions and an undeveloped mind's mad passion for gay life.

The police are dilating between the theories that a religious maniac slew Alice and that she was a victim of one of her sweethearts.

The case grows more mysterious hourly.

Despite the efforts of the police they are no nearer a solution than they were when the body was found. It is claimed the girl was seen on July 5 by some clerks in a store in this city, but so far the police have been unable to prove these statements.

On Wednesday Johns was freed of the charge. Although the coroner's verdict vindicated him, he was held by the authorities as it was thought he knew more of the crime than he would tell.

WOULD LIMIT THE DIRECTORS' WORK

Proposition to Prohibit Interlocking of Directorates of Banks Proposed to House Committee.

WASHINGTON, July 18.—An amendment to the Glass-Steagall currency bill, to prohibit interlocking directorates in banking institutions, was proposed at the conference of democrats of the house committee Thursday.

Earlier in the day the conference had defeated, 8 to 3, another proposal by Rep. Wingo, that government funds should be deposited in the proposed new regional reserve banks upon a competitive basis, deposits being made in banks offering the highest rate of interest.

The democrats struck out of the bill a section to permit individual banks, in time of stress, to get direct discounts from the regional reserve banks, upon securities recognized as “stock exchange collateral,” and also eliminated a provision exempting notes or bills issued on government, state, county or municipal bonds from the proposed prohibition against re-discounting by the federal reserve banks of notes or bills issued for the purpose of “carrying or trading in stocks, bonds or other securities.”

The conference extended the maturity period of paper re-discountable under the law, from 45 to 60 days.

Sections of the bill relating to the regular examinations of banks, and to penalties for examiners who accept gratuities or loans from banks.

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SAYS OFFICERS THREW MAN INTO THE OCEAN

BROCKVILLE, Ont., July 18.—Brock Quong, a sailor on the British steamer Thyra Menier, in port at Ogdensburg, N. Y., reported to the police of that city Thursday that on June 15, while the vessel was running between Montreal and Quebec, a fellow sailor named A. H. Klou was thrown into the river by officers of the vessel and drowned.

Although the alleged offense was committed in Canadian waters, the government has asked the United States authorities to co-operate in conducting an investigation. The Thyra Menier is engaged in the pulp carrying trade from the island of Anticosti in the gulf of St. Lawrence.

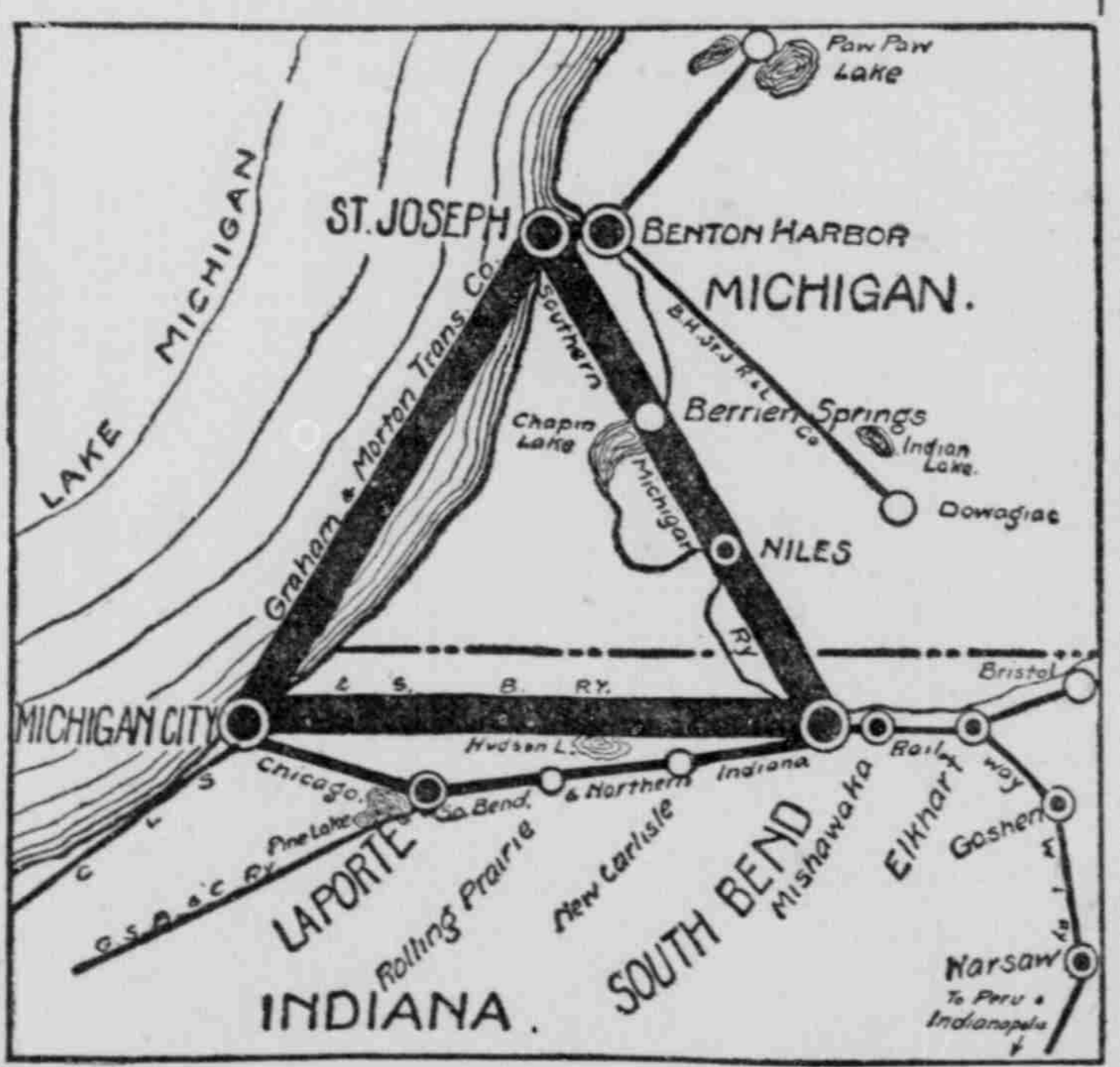
