

WANT PUBLICITY ON PRISON CONDITIONS

Unless Government Takes Up Question Prison Association Will Do the Work.

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 17.—A resolution recommending that the government have a national prison commission to supervise the federal penitentiaries and also to lend aid in the management of state prisons, was adopted at the closing session of the American prison association here Thursday night.

The commission would be appointed by the president and the president of the association was instructed to name a committee of five to place the proposition before Pres. Wilson and the attorney general.

On motion of W. H. Moyer, warden of the federal penitentiary at Atlanta, Ga., it was decided to find means where by complete and authentic information concerning the actual conditions existing in prisons of this country, could be secured and published. Unless this can be accomplished through the government the association will undertake to do so itself.

SAFETY AT SEA TAKEN UP BY THE SENATORS

Members of Senate Express Opinion That More Adequate Laws are Needed Badly.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—Safety at sea for travelers and improved working conditions for sailors on merchant ships were taken up in the senate Thursday when debate began on the Seaman's servitude bill. The Voltorno disaster figured prominently in the discussion. Senators expressed the opinion that more adequate laws on loading of cargoes and requiring higher efficiency in crews would do much to prevent similar catastrophes.

Sen. Lafollette charged that large shipping interests had prevented adequate reform for years. He presented a substitute for the bill which would go farther in requiring an absolute test of efficiency for seamen on ocean liners.

Fire drills and life boat drills cannot be had on ocean yessels, the senator contended, under conditions approaching those which confront a ship's crew at the time of disaster at sea. The greatest safety, he said, lies in a law that will require an adequate number of seamen, thoroughly trained. The senate has agreed to vote not later than Oct. 22. The measure passed the last congress but was pocket-vetoed by Pres. Taft.
