AT THE AUDITORIUM.

"Island of Regeneration," the unique romance by the Rev. Cyrus Townsend Brady, featuring the clever player Edith Storey, supported by Antonio Moreno and S. AT THE LASALLE.

Miss Charlotte Walker, one of the most charming of the younger American stars, will make her film debut at the LaSalle today in a picture titled "Kindling." Miss Walker is the wife of Eugene Walter, the famous playwright.

"Kindling" deals with the sordid life of New York existence. In a most sympathetic manner it tells the life story of Maggie Schultz and her husband, Heinie, who dwells in a wretched tenement, owned by a rich widow, whose ideas of sweet charity do not concern her own property.

This play, which had a long and highly successful Broadway run, is one of the most daring and dramatic offerings ever produced on the American stage. It hits at the big things of life—the elemental emotions—and hits at them hard. On the same program will be seen the comedy, "There's Many a Slip."

"The Clue" in which Blanche Sweet makes her appearance at the LaSalle Saturday, is, as might readily be inferred from the name, a detective drama involving the problem of a murder mystery. The clue, from which the drama takes its name, is a Russian coin which has been given by a Russian adventurer, Count Boris, to a rich American whose hand he is seeking to win, and which has been given by her to the American gentleman she really loves, just to prove that she does not hold the keepsake to be of value in her eyes. When the brother of Boris is murdered this coin is found near the murdered man, and therefore tends to divert attention in the wrong direction.

AT THE INDIANA.

"The Working of a Miracle," a two reel Edison feature, will be shown at the Indiana today, introducing Gladys Hulette and Edward Earle in an interesting story concerning a young school teacher who is abused by a cruel guardian and who is saved from a frightful death by her crippled sweetheart whose strength is restored apparently by a miracle. A roaring college comedy entitled "He's a Bear," and a laughable romantic farce, "The Girl Hater," will be shown on the same bill.

On Saturday dainty Edna Mayo impersonates a boy in the romantic drama entitled "The Little Deceiver," and by her personal charm adds much to the interest of the picture. Helen Holmes, a former South Bend girl, who has had quite a pronounced success in the films by riding wild engines and rescuing imperiled trainmen, will be seen in a new release entitled "A Railroaders' Bravery." On the same program will be seen one of the latest Selig animal pictures, "Beautiful Belinda."

Coming attractions of importance are announced at the Indiana, including the first of the King W. Lardner's baseball series, "From Buss to Gus;" "Tillie's Punctured Romance," and "Judith of Bethulia."

STORY OF GERMAN VESSEL IS RELATED

Mine Layer Meteor Had Many Adventures in Fighting Off "Britishers".

BERLIN, Aug. 12 (wireless via Sayville).—How the crew of the little German mine layer Meteor sank the British patrol boat Ramsay, rescued 63 of her crew and brought them safely ashore to German soil, escaping four British battle cruisers which had given chase and cut the Meteor off from her base is told in unofficial dispatches made public here Thursday.

The Meteor, which carried a crew of only about 25 men, succeeded in passing the English coast guard in laying mines along the British coast, incidentally sank an English sailing ship and took its crew prisoners. On the night of August 7 when she was south of the Orkney Islands and about 550 miles from her home base the Meteor encountered the British auxiliary cruiser Ramsay and attacked and destroyed her. She saved 40 men and four officers of the Ramsay. More than 60 of the Ramsay's complement are believed to have drowned.

The British fleet was notified by wireless of the sinking of the Ramsay. Four battle cruisers gave chase to the Meteor and cut her off from her base, rendering escape impossible. In this emergency the Meteor stopped a Norwegian steamer. She transferred her own crew, together with the captured Englishmen from the Ramsay and from the sunken sailing vessel, placing them on board the Norwegian steamer. The crew of the Norwegian boat were then put aboard a boat at a point where they could reach shore. The Meteor was sunk by exploding the mines on board her, so that she should not fall into the hands of the British. The German crew then sailed the Norwegian steamer to a German port, which they reached safely, bringing their British prisoners with them.

TO INCREASE AMOUNT OF HOME GROWN FOOD

English Cabinet Receives Report From Board of Agriculture on Question.

LONDON, Aug. 12.—The cabinet has received an exhaustive report on ways of increasing the amount of home grown food in 1915 submitted by the food supplies committee of the board of agriculture.

The committee finding that sufficient number of farming implements for an extensive increase in wheat acreage could not be manufactured in England, has recommended that the government buy a large quantity of agricultural machinery in the United States.

IS BAILLY SAVED. DES MOINES, Iowa, Aug. 12.—Dist. Judge McHenry saved Bedford D. Sudbury of Bloomington, Ind., having two wives and returned unseathed to him a legacy of \$200,000. Sudbury married a Muncie, Ind., woman in 1893, but the couple separated in 1898. In 1914 he remarried. Mrs. Sudbury No. 1 later attempted to obtain part of the legacy, but Judge McHenry learned Sudbury had obtained a divorce by default.
