NEED MORE THAN \$100,000,000 FOR Y. M. WORK

Losses Incidental to the German Drive on Western Front Make a Large Fund Imperative.

NEW YORK, June 4.—Losses incidental to the German push on the western front have made it imperative that more than \$100,000,000 be subscribed during the coming campaign for funds with which to maintain a Y. M. C. A. war service activities at home and overseas, the annual meeting of the association's war council was told here today by Dr. John R. Mott, general secretary, who returned from France recently.

The association has appropriated a half million dollars with which to replace the \$2 hits and discounts lost by the British in Flanders and Picardy during the recent Hun drive. Within the last week more than 200 of these recreation centers back of the French lines have fallen into enemy hands, Dr. Mott declared.

These also must be replaced. Securing an adequate supply of "man power" is a matter quite as vital to the association's work as a well supplied treasury, the secretary said. It is planned that expansion of the association's work may be kept pace with the development of the army and navy, and to do this it will be necessary to transport overseas, by September 4,000 additional workers, 1,000 of whom should be women, he added. Enough men will be recruited eventually, it is hoped, to allot one secretary to each 500 fighting men. Dr. Mott stated. Workers now are being enrolled at the rate of 1,000 monthly.

Reports submitted during the meeting showed that 115,135,500 cigarettes; 1,200,000 treatments; 1,000,000 feet of motion picture film; 300,000,000 sheets of stationery; 2,000,000 packages of chewing gum; \$313,000 cigars; 30,000,000 cans of preserved fruit; and 21,000 phonograph records, together with tons of baseballs, footballs and other athletic paraphernalia, have been sent abroad.

The financial statement announced that the collected subscriptions from the two drives made last year amounted on March 31 to \$37,577,481. Of the overseas expenditures of \$10,168,710, the largest item was that of \$8,600,702 on the work with the American expeditionary forces in England and France.

Boche Continues to Throw Bombs On Hospitals

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY IN PICARDY, June 4.—The Americans Monday night aided the French for the first time in manning anti-aircraft guns in villages in Picardy and kept up a terrific barrage when enemy aircraft again attempted to bomb hospitals and peaceful homes of civilians. One German airplane is reported to have been brought down in the rear of the American lines.

Bombs were dropped again near several hospitals. The enemy continued to shell villages in which American sick and wounded were lying.

The enemy artillery and machine guns are active around Cantigny and all efforts to capture the village have been frustrated.

An enemy patrol was fired on early this morning by an American patrol. One German was killed and the body brought in. The American artillery continued to harass the enemy; a fire was observed in Montdidier.

Enemy aircraft have been particularly active in this sector. They have done no military damage, but continue nightly raids on villages behind the lines, bombing promiscuously. Fortunately, most of the tombs have dropped in fields.

DESCRIBES BURIAL OF BOLSHEVIKI VICTIMS

AMSTERDAM, June 4.—Mass burials of corpses washed up by the Black sea are described by Edmont Zechin, the Lokal Anzeiger's correspondent in Ukraine. Many of the bodies were horribly mutilated and the hands and feet were tied together. These were the victims of the bolsheviks at Eupatoria, Crimea. They were sentenced to death, taken out into the Black sea in barges and drowned in a manner recalling the horrors of the French revolution. One woman named Njemitz, a member of the bolshevik committee, was arrested by the Germans. Whenever the death sentence seemed to hang in the balance she cast the deciding vote with a shout, "The revolution must see blood."

The correspondent tells of a Russian lieutenant who, after three years of hard campaigning, stood in the front of the ruins of his parental home waiting for the waves to cast up the bodies of his father and mother.

REPORT NAMES OF ALL IDLERS

Regulations Affecting Men Who Do Not Work Issued.

WASHINGTON, June 4.—Rules for the enforcement of Provost Marshal Gen. Crowder's "work or fight" regulations, announced Monday, call on all citizens to report to the nearest local draft board names of men within draft age who are habitually idle or who are employed non-productively.

Each local board is created into what will be practically a court to sit probably weekly to decide such cases as may be brought before it. Upon a case being presented the board will serve a notice on the registrant not less than three days nor more than seven days, directing him to present such evidence as he may care to submit.

In every case the board must send the complete record to the district board for approval even if the decision is in favor of a man. If the district board approves the findings adverse to a registrant he will be given notice and if any vacancies exist will be sent immediately to camp or placed at the top of the list of those next to go.

An appeal to the president may be made only in the event of a dissenting vote in the district board and with recommendation of the appeal agent or adjutant general.

TO HOLD CONFERENCE OF CLUB SUPERVISORS

LAFAYETTE, Ind., June 4.—A conference of boys and girls' club supervisors will be held at Purdue university June 5, 6 and 7, it was announced Monday. Men and women in charge of the club work will be here from every county in the state. Besides addresses by the agricultural leaders at the university, county agents, the supervisors and others, Dean Stanley E. Coulter of Purdue; J. A. Linke, federal agent for agricultural education; J. G. Colcott, state director of vocational education; Otis E. Hall, Manhattan, Kan., state leader of club work in Kansas, and Miss Gertrude Warren of Washington, in charge of girls' canning club work, will be on the program. The conference will close Friday with the business session of the Indiana vocational agricultural teachers' association.

The schools of Franklin are organized into war savings societies which will continue to meet during the summer vacation. The investments of school teachers and pupils of Franklin in Thrift and War Savings stamps amounts to several thousand dollars.

OPPOSITION DEVELOPS TO PROHIBITION RIDER

WASHINGTON, June 4.—Opposition from "dry" as well as "wet" champions is developing in the senate to the prohibition rider attached by the house to the \$11,000,000 emergency agricultural appropriation bill which would prevent expenditure of about \$5,000,000 unless President Wilson exercises his power under the food control act to prohibit use of grains in making beer and light wines during the war. As a substitute, prohibition advocates favor an amendment proposed by Sen. Jones of Washington to flatly forbid the use of foodstuffs for making intoxicants of any kind during the war.
