

DUAL EMPIRE IS OVERJOYED WITH PEACE

Vienna Delirious When People Learn That Armistice Has Been Signed—Expect Food to Come.

GENEVA, Nov. 5.—Vienna was delirious with joy when it was learned that an armistice had been declared. The streets were soon crowded with men and women and children crying and embracing each other.

The general opinion is that food will follow peace. The report that Emperor Charles has abdicated aroused little interest. The Austrian press is attempting to calm the population, emphasizing the fact that the armistice terms are of a most severe nature and involve great sacrifices to the empire and the people.

HUNGARY UNDECIDED REGARDING RULE.

AMSTERDAM, Nov. 5.—Count Karolyi, the Hungarian premier, addressing a public meeting, is quoted in a dispatch from Budapest as saying:

"The elementary power and public opinion having desired that not only democracy and independence should be realized, but that a decision should be taken regarding the future form of government, the king at the government's request, has released the ministers from their oath."

A resolution was then passed providing for a plebiscite to decide on the question of a monarchy or a republic for Hungary.

TAKE THE INEVITABLE STEP, GERMAN PRESS ADVICE TO EMPEROR

AMSTERDAM, Nov. 5.—The Berlin Tageblatt's Munich correspondent says the bourgeois as well as the social democratic parties of Bavaria are demanding the abdication of the emperor.

The Munich Neueste Nachrichten, a copy of which has been received here says:

"Even the decree of the kaiser endorsing the new state form of government could not restore the people's confidence in him."

Even the national liberal Augsburg Abend Zeitung demands that the imperial and federal governments shall urgently request Emperor William to take the "inevitable step."

PRESIDENT OF B. AND O. ACCEPTS COMMISSION

BALTIMORE, Nov. 5.—Discussing his appointment as a colonel of engineers in the American army, Daniel Willard, president of the Baltimore and Ohio railroad, said tonight:

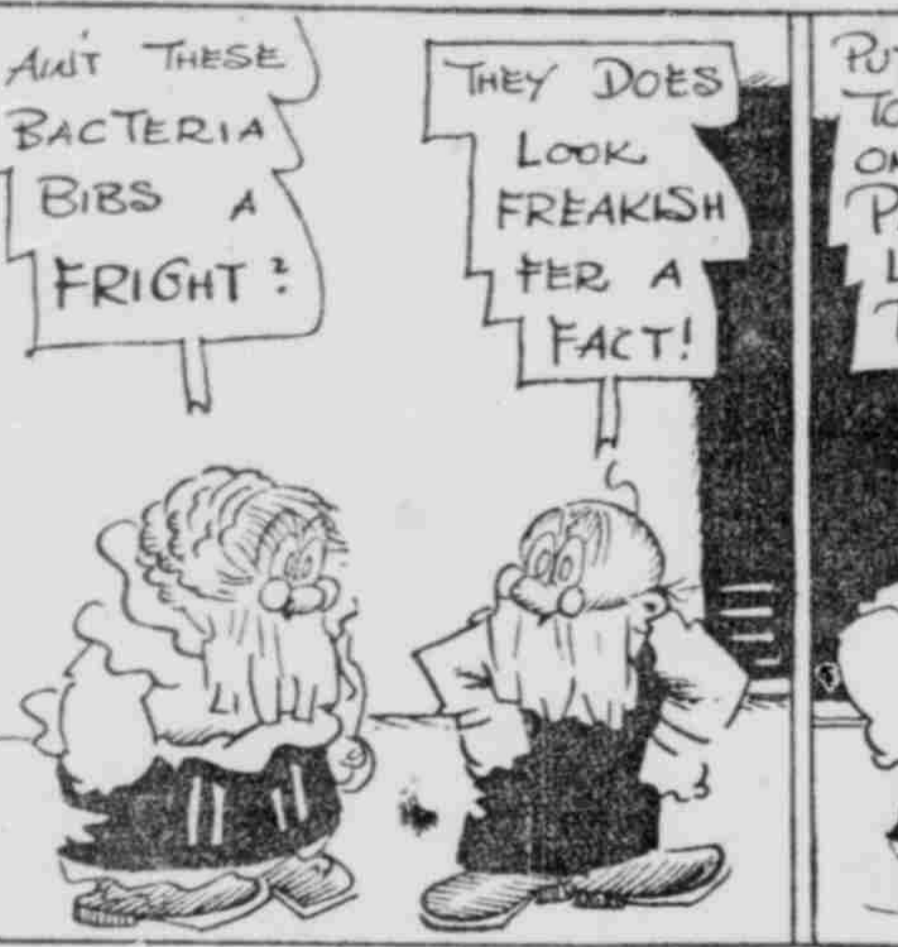
"I have been offered the commission and have accepted it, and have been ordered to report first to Gen. Atterbury. My order is to go to France and report for duty, and I will do so at the earliest possible moment."

"The position of president will not be filled during my absence, but L. F. Looze, who at one time was president of the road, will act as chairman of the executive committee while I am gone, and the executive committee will naturally deal with any and all matters that will require their attention."

Of his duties Col. Willard declined to talk. But his work will have to do with the construction of American and French railways in France.

ENTIRE TRAIN SOLDIERS' BREAD

All Supplies Shipped to Concentrating Point in Same Huge Bulk.

A AMERICAN REGULATION BASE, FRANCE. (Correspondence)—Bread for the American soldiers is brought here by trainloads from the great army field bakery a few miles distant—one train of thirty cars a day all loaded with white bread from the best of wheat flour.

One such train was arriving as the Associated Press correspondent visited the base. Another trainload of refrigerated beef arrived soon afterward from the great refrigerating plant at Gievere.

It was the same with other classes of supplies, rations, forage fuel and oil—all came in huge bulk to this concentrating and distributing point, for this is one of the great nerve centers of supplies for the fighting men.

Here the trainloads are broken up into fifteen parts, two cars to a part and each part goes toward making up a new "automatic train" supplies of all kinds to the soldiers—fifteen trains—a day automatically leaving for the front loaded with food or fighting material.

Puffing yard engines were doing the work of splitting up the trains and reforming new ones. Gradually the congested mass of cars, the bread and meat trains melted away and the 15 automatic trains took definite form. As they were completed they moved off to sidings to take their turn in the steady stream of trains moving out to the fighting front.

This is the process, repeated day after day, in the formation of the automatic trains that furnish the marvel of transportation that has so bewildered and surprised the foreign observers.

The last stage as the supplies pass to the troops at the front is where the automatic train reaches the rail-head of the division. Each American division has its fixed rail-head, or terminal, where the train delivers its daily quota. This is as near the troops in the field as fighting conditions will permit. But in many cases it is not possible to bring the division's rail-head close to the front, so that in these cases cannon transit fills the gap between the rail-head and the fighting front.

A rail-head officer is in charge at these points reporting back nightly to headquarters here as to the strength of men and animals in the division, and its varying needs caused by active fighting or periods of repose. Thus each division rail-head becomes a regulating station for the needs of that fighting unit, while all of them are linked back here to this huge central regulating station where the steady lines of supplies are kept moving forward.

WATCHES MADE FROM OLD BELGIAN CANNON

HAVRE.—Souvenirs in the shape of watches made from the steel of Belgian cannon which were in active service on the Belgian front since the beginning of the war in 1914 till October 29, 1917, are being manufactured in Switzerland by order of the King and Queen of the Belgians. The watches, which bear inset in gold on the cases the monogram "A E" of the Belgian sovereigns, are to be presented by King Albert and Queen Elizabeth to soldiers who have especially distinguished themselves, and also to prize-winners of military competitions.

800,000,000 RUBLES RESTORED AT KAZAN

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Nov. 5.—Reports from 42 counties in Indiana, covering the two-day period since Saturday, received by the state board of health today showed a total of 1,244 new cases of influenza.

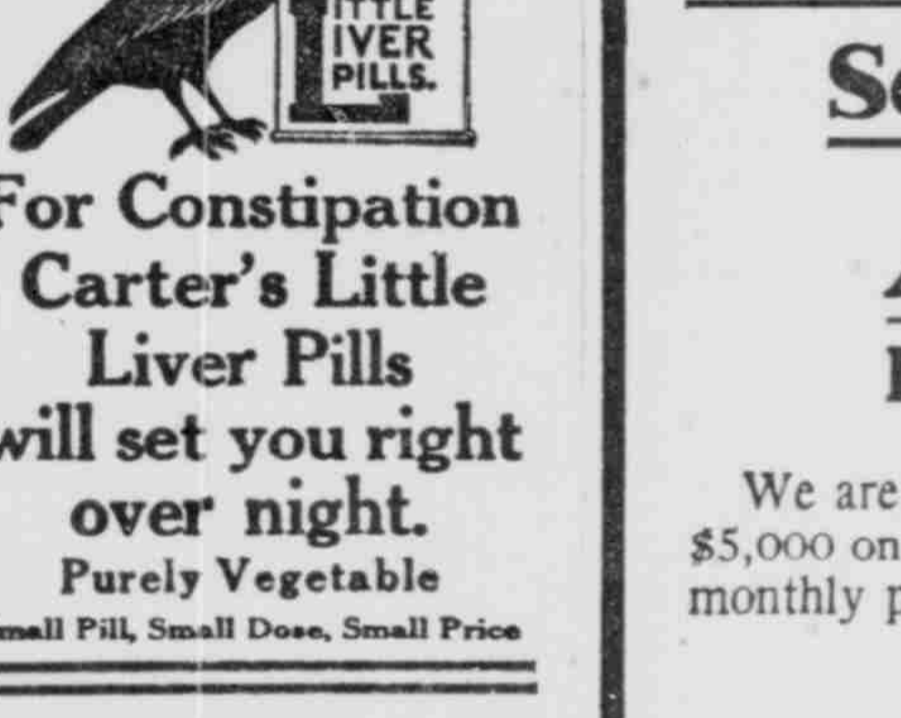
