NEW HIGHWAY COMES TO LEGISLATURE

Hoosier Motor Club, County Commissioners Association, and Road Superintendents Endorse New Law.

News-Times Special Service: INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Dec. 30.—A new state highway commission law, a law for the creation of a county unit system of bonding, construction and maintenance of the lesser roads of the state and revisions of the present three-mile gravel road law, were agreed on by representatives of the Hoosier Motor club, the Indiana state chamber of commerce, the County Commissioners association, the road superintendents of the state, and many others interested, who appeared at a meeting called at the Severin hotel by the special legislative roads committee, which is investigating sentiment throughout the state on the road question.

That the next legislature will make an effort to pass a state highway commission law, carrying broad centralized authority, and that funds for its maintenance will be drawn from the present automobile license law revenues (added to by increased fees on automobile trucks), the inheritance tax law revenues (to be increased if a special act is passed calling for enlargement of the present inheritance tax law's provisions), and a state road tax of one mill on each \$100 worth of property, was forecast when the meeting here adopted unanimously a motion introduced by Ensey Johnson, county attorney of Marion county, which called for an enactment of a statute under which a non-partisan highway commission, with power to centralize road construction and maintenance power in its own appointees, and to cooperate with the federal government to such an extent that Indiana will reap all possible benefits from federal-aid-to-states appropriations for good roads.

Sentiment to repeal the three-mile gravel road law was attacked by several at the meeting, and it seemed that some action will be taken to conserve the good points of that law by incorporation into the proposed county unit law. The urgent need of immediate and intelligent revision of the state's road program was dilated on by many notable Hoosiers, in addresses to the meeting, and the war need for such revision was shown in many instances quoted, where the Hoosier road system had broken down under the heavy traffic of army trucks.
