

SAMUEL GOMPERS BADLY INJURED

Labor Federation President Is Hurling Thirty Feet in Auto Collision.

NEW YORK, April 28.—Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, was seriously injured here Sunday afternoon, when a taxicab in which he was riding was struck by a Broadway surface car and hurled 26 feet to the curb.

Surgeons who were summoned reported after an examination that two of Mr. Gompers' ribs had been fractured, his right hip sprained and that he had suffered severe body contusions. Despite the advanced age of the labor leader, who is 69 years old, the surgeons declared there was no likelihood of the injuries proving fatal.

Has Been Busy.

Mr. Gompers has been busy virtually every minute since his return from the peace conference, where he served as chairman of the commission on international labor legislation. He had just started out from his hotel for an hour's relaxation when the accident occurred.

As the taxicab crossed the Broadway car tracks at 31st st., it was struck by a northbound car. Pedestrians who witnessed the crash rushed to the wrecked machine and extricated Mr. Gompers, who was found to be unconscious. One side of the cab was completely crushed in and the wreckage had pinned him against the other side of the machine.

Carried to Hotel.

Mr. Gompers was carried back to his hotel. After an examination surgeons decided it would be unwise to remove him to a hospital.

Although it was insisted that Mr. Gompers' condition was not critical, officials of the American Federation of Labor said bulletins would be issued from time to time reporting his conditions.

NURSES PARADING AT VICTORY WAY

In order that the public shall not forget the part nurses played in the war, 300 of these brave women, wearing the uniform of the army nurse, took part in the special parade arranged in New York as a prelude to the Nurses' Day meeting in Victory Way. So far this centre of Victory Liberty Loan activity has been dedicated to women's war work and women's appeal for funds. The nurses walked in a parade which started in Central Park and proceeded south in Fifth avenue to Fifty-second street east to Park avenue and Victory Way. Thirty-six ambulances, representing every chapter of the metropolitan section of the Atlantic Division of the Red Cross, ninety-six stretcher bearers, carrying their stretchers, and the Red Cross Band of sixty, led by Morris M. Lentner, were in line. Major Dorothy C. Smyln, assistant director of the Red Cross Motor Corps, was marshal.

MONTENEGROAN INTRIGUE VICTIM

Alexander Devine Declares Nations Have Ignored Existence as a Country.

LONDON, March 26.—(By mail)—Charges that Montenegro, the smallest of the allies, has been a victim of intrigue during the war, are made by Alexander Devine of Winchester, a friend of the little Balkan country. In a letter of complaint to Premier Lloyd George, Mr. Devine writes:

"The great feature of intrigue has been to ignore her existence as a separate country; then to protest that fraternal confederation with her was most desirable; and finally to deliberately attempt to absorb her existence and nationality."

Mr. Lloyd George replied that he hoped and believed that the interests of Montenegro would be amply protected at the peace conference.

TO PREVENT SHIPMENT OF LIQUOR TO STATES

HAVANA, Cuba, April 28.—The captain of the Port of Havana has notified firms which furnish supplies for fishing vessels that watch will be kept over such shipping and that visits of inspection will be made to see that they carry no more food and liquor when leaving port than is necessary for their own use.

This measure is due to information received by the port official that several fishing vessels have taken quantities of rum and other liquors aboard to be exchanged in American jurisdictional waters for other merchandise.
