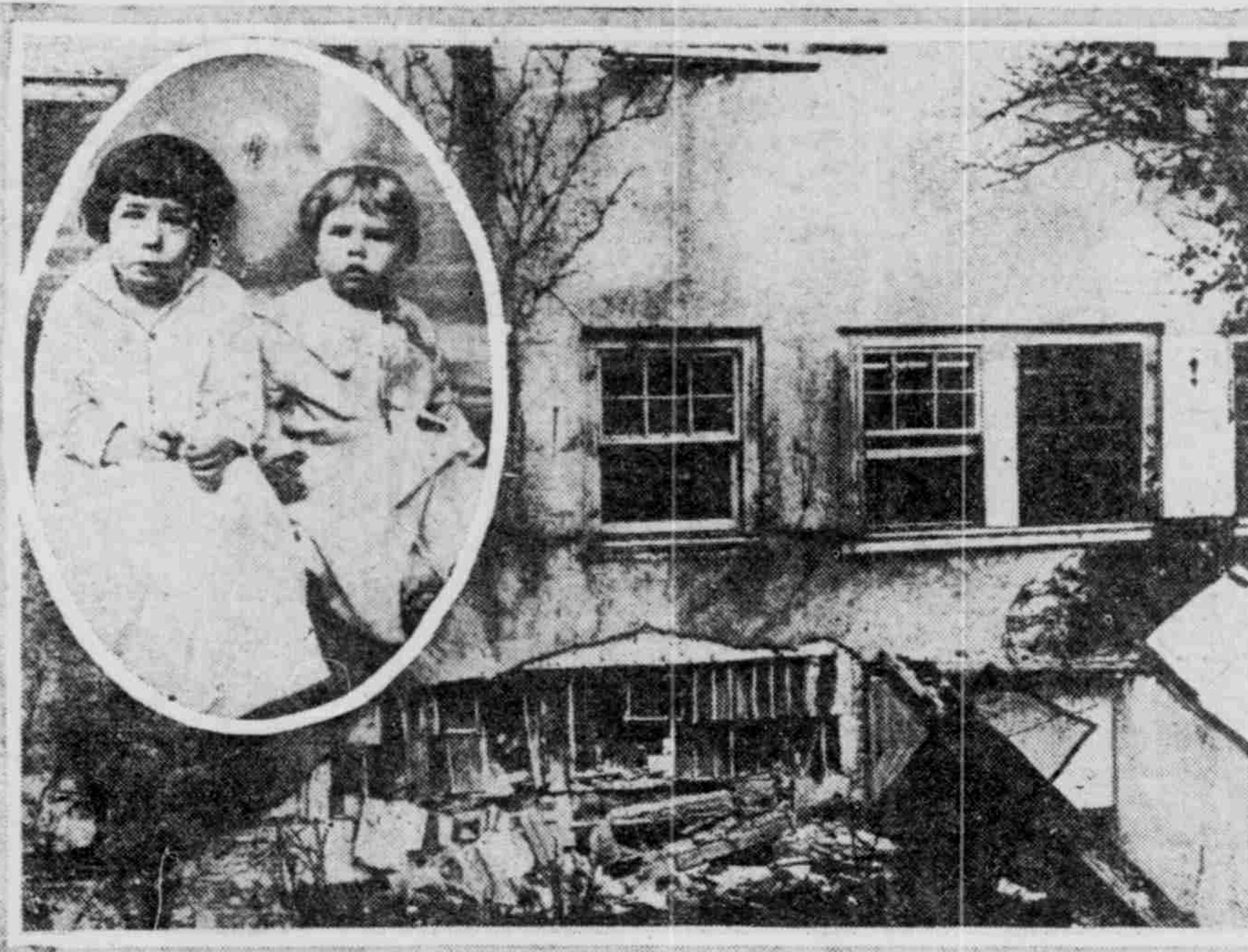
BRITISH CARGO SHIP, BADLY DAMAGED BY FIRE, TOWED TO PORT
