WAR DEPARTMENT READY FOR ACTION GERMANS ACCEPT TREATY, WORD TO U. S. COMMISSION

WORK IN AMERICA IS TO FURNISH SUPPLIES

If Germany Fails to Sign Peace Terms American Troops' Main Objective Will Be Cassel, Near Coblenz.

WASHINGTON, June 20.—War department plans for action in case of the Germans' refusal to sign the treaty, are complete. Strategic features of the action, military experts here say, would be handled in France by Marshal Foch and his aides, and it is not anticipated that there would be need of additional American troops.

WILSON RETURNS TO PEACE TABLE

Spends Two Days in Belgium With King Albert and People.

PARIS, June 20.—President Wilson returned to Paris at 5 o'clock this morning after a visit of two days in Belgium which cemented even more closely the friendship of the little kingdom and the big republic.

In the two days he spent in Belgium the president was accorded every honor within the power of King Albert and his people.

Addressing parliament, President Wilson took occasion to emphasize the importance of the league of nations.

To Welcome Independence. The president announced it was his intention to propose to congress that the American legation in Belgium be raised to the rank of an embassy as a recognition, as a welcome to Belgium in her new status of complete independence.

ALLIES PLAN TO MAKE FOES WORK

May Take Over Administration of German Affairs of State.

NEW YORK, June 20.—Marshal Foch will be able to occupy the principal strategic points in Germany within forty-eight hours, the Germans refuse to sign the peace treaty, but this will be only the beginning of the allies' activities.

After holding all the military centers, the allies will be compelled to take over the administration of Germany and put the German people to work. The enforcement of the blockade will keep food from entering Germany for indiscriminate distribution, but the allies will scarcely try to compel the Germans to sign the peace treaty by a deliberate policy of general starvation.

May Control Industries. If the Germans remain stubborn during the enforcement of the blockade, the reorganization of German industries under the direction of the allies will become necessary.

PLAN ERECTING NEW INTERNATIONAL BRIDGE

Army Bill Will Be Reported to Senators Today

WASHINGTON, June 20.—Administration forces on the senate military affairs committee planned today to conduct a vigorous fight for an army of 500,000, as asked by Sec'y Baker. They will urge rejection of a tentative figure of 400,000, adopted last night.

WASHINGTON, June 20.—Fear that the vatican will be restored to temporal dominion over the world by organization of the league of nations was expressed today by Sen. Sherman, Illinois, in a speech to the senate.

HEAVY FORCES CONCENTRATED

BERNE, June 20.—Heavy forces of infantry and cavalry men have been concentrated at Winterthur, Schaffhausen and Frauenfeld to protect the frontiers in case of possible disorders in Germany, following decision of the peace treaty.

LABOR LEADERS DEBATE ON PACT

Gompers Will Lead Speakers Who Are Favorable to League.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., June 20.—The league of nations was the question at issue before the American Federation of Labor convention today.

The afternoon session was set aside for debate on the covenant and for a vote on the proposition of endorsing it. Pres't Samuel Gompers leads the delegates who favor the league.

Gompers was expected to make one of the most brilliant speeches of his career in support of the covenant and the peace treaty, pointing out that neither is perfect, but asserting they represent the greatest steps forward ever taken for the benefit of labor and humanity.

REPORTS SAY GERMANS SIGNED PEACE PACT

LONDON, June 20.—An Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Paris this afternoon reported the German government at Weimar had accepted the peace treaty.

Program Meets Approval. The questions of the day were rendered more serious by international events in April. In the face of this situation, the government voiced a program meeting with parliament's and the country's approval.

ORLANDO AND CABINET GIVE RESIGNATIONS

Chamber of Deputies Rejects Premier's Call for Secret Session to Study Vote.

ROME, June 20.—Premier Orlando announced Thursday that his cabinet had tendered its resignation to King Victor Emmanuel, who had reserved decision. The statement was made after the chamber of deputies had rejected 250 to 78 the premier's motion for the chamber to convene in secret session to consider a vote of confidence.

Before Orlando asked for a secret session he spoke at length on the international situation. His speech was adversely received. He was often interrupted by uproars which compelled him to cease speaking.

FAVORS PEACE LEAGUE. WASHINGTON, June 20.—Congress will be a check on the league of nations and a permanent guardian of American sovereignty under the league, Sen. Sheppard, Texas, declared in his speech answering league critics.

We are not thus left "naked to our enemies," whether of this war or any future war, in any other way than that that they are equally "naked" to us.

More than this, is there not a humorous phase of this objection when we consider the constant course of this country since the beginning of its history? In spite of the urging of Washington and many of his successors, we never have had an adequate armament until after the war has come. Not even for mere police duty have we had a sufficient regular army in time of peace.
