COOPERATION MEANS HEALTH. Employers and welfare workers often find that one of their greatest difficulties is interesting shop workers in sanitary personal habits.

While there is a better understanding than formerly of the importance of hygiene, still there is a multitude of workers who feel insulted if approached on the subject, or who remain stolidly indifferent.

If the sanitary policy of the town is good, if cleanliness of streets, houses and yards is insisted upon and enforced by the authorities, it creates a public spirit which makes it easier for the private citizen to carry out the same policy in his workshop.

IN THE FARM OFFICE. A full page advertisement of all sorts of office equipment, to be used in keeping farm accounts, is being published in daily papers all over the country.

There is the typewriter, for correspondence, there is the adding machine, for accounts; there are special books for farm bookkeeping, the cash register for handling small cash, and numerous other devices such as are used daily in business offices and stores.

Dealers report an increasing demand for such mechanical devices for farm use, and farmers are found everywhere who gladly affirm the time and money saving value of office equipment for keeping farm records in a businesslike manner.

Other Editors Than Ours

Opposition to the league of nations is apparently dwindling in the United States senate. The only real bone of contention seems to be article X, which guarantees the integrity and independence of all members of the league.

Mr. Root also objects to the present covenant of the league because it does not provide for a system of arbitration or judicial decisions or the development of international law.

He favors the separation of the covenant from the peace treaty proper, in conformity with the resolution offered by Sen. Knox; but if the whole pact with such reservations as will virtually amend it in accordance with his suggestions.

It does not matter whether changes in the league of nations covenant are made through a resolution of reservation or through direct amendment. One is as effective as the other.

Mr. Root says "there is in the covenant a great deal of high value that the world ought not to lose." There is room for hope, then, that we are to have a league of nations after all, and a better league than we would have had without the determined opposition that the first draft of the covenant aroused.

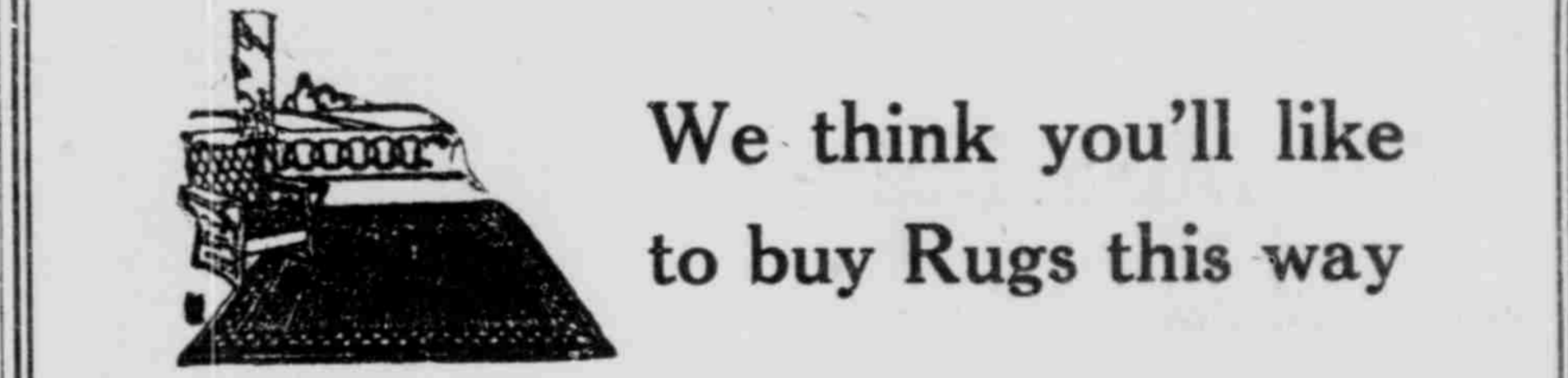

NURSING IN CHRONIC HEART DISEASES

Good, careful nursing in cases of advanced heart diseases greatly lessens the discomfort of the patient. Two points are of special importance: Position, and diet.

Most every patient afflicted with heart trouble assumes a characteristic position which enables her to secure the greatest amount of comfort. Some patients lie on their back, some on their side, while others sit up and lean forward.

The diet should be nutritious, and of such nature as not to produce gas, which interferes with the heart action. Small meals should be given at frequent intervals.

Some heart cases have a persistent cough, and there is apt to be expectation, any variation in which should be reported to the doctor. Likewise the color of the face should be noted.

W. S. writes: I heard a sick person say that she enjoyed toast water so much. I would like to know how to make it? Answer: Take a thick slice of bread, cut it into cubes; toast it in the oven until it is brown; pour a cupful of hot water over toast; add a quarter of a teaspoonful of salt and let stand until it cools. Then strain and serve hot or cold.
