KING ALBERT IS EXPECTED HERE

City Council Extends Invitation—Important Meeting Monday Night.

According to the Belgium consul at Chicago, Mishawaka stands a good chance of having the King and Queen of Belgium visit here during their forthcoming trip to the United States. Mayor Gaylor so reported to the city council at its bi-monthly meeting Monday night. Mishawaka is the only city in the country that has sent an official invitation to King Albert and his consort, and the consul at Chicago advised the mayor that they would in all probability accept of it. In the invitation sent officially by the city it is stated "that Mishawaka is proud to number among its 18,000 inhabitants, 5,000 citizens in whose veins runs Belgium can citizens, naturally cherish in their hearts a love for the fatherland and an interest in its welfare, and who also joyfully and patriotically support all war activities and seek to serve in the war 100 men, several of whom were called upon to make the supreme sacrifice."

The council took up the matter of telephone rates, and after receiving a report from the city attorney, decided to fight any attempted increase, to the limit of its ability. A petition signed by E. N. Weber and 18 others asking that the display of merchandise on the sidewalks be discontinued was referred to the board of public safety.

No Band Concerts.

Owing to the fact that the 1919 budget did not provide money for free band concerts in the parks, it will be impossible for the council to grant the petition asking for such entertainments.

It was decided that the city take out a membership in the Indiana association park department.

Claims for amount of \$3,041.45 were allowed.

The next meeting of the council will be held the day after Labor day, Sept. 2.

CITY BUDGET FOR 1920 IS APPROVED

Amounts to \$65,150—Many New Improvements Contemplated.

The city budget for 1920 was submitted by City Controller Michael at the regular weekly meeting of the board of works Monday, and was adopted. It calls for the following allotments: Street department, salaries and labor, \$12,000; supplies and expense, \$500; equipment, \$500; engineer department, salary and labor, \$5,000; supplies, \$200; engineering, advertising and inspection, \$800; park department, park purchase, \$4,200; salaries and labor, \$2,400; supplies, \$300; park development, \$5,000; city hall, salaries and labor, \$1,100; supplies, \$250; repairs, \$300; heating, \$1,800; garbage and rubbish, salaries and labor, \$4,500; supplies, \$100; city sealer, salary, \$500; expense, \$100; board of works, \$2,000; expense, \$100; sundry appropriation, utility lease, \$6,500; public water and electricity, \$18,000. Total appropriation, \$65,150.

Remonstrance for the sidewalk on the east side of Main st. from Grand Trunk tracks to Jefferson st. was received and referred to city attorney and engineer.

Plan New Garden House.

A new garden house for Battell park has been received and the board decided to place it in position so it can be ready for use next spring. In connection with this the controller reported that the \$5,500 allotted for parks during the current year had been spent. He asked for an allotment for the purpose of settling for the garden house. This was granted.

The board passed a resolution for a sidewalk on Jefferson st., from Main to Sarah, and for the building of a sidewalk and the grading of N. Charlotte st. The time for hearings on this will be Sept. 8.

A resolution was passed for the opening of Thirteenth st. Hearings will be Sept. 8.

A resolution for the building of sidewalks on W. Sixth st. from Smith to Logan was adopted.
