COAL STRIKE SITUATION IS CRITICAL

PESSIMISM EXPOSED OVER COMING MEETING

Senate Committee Ready to Step in if Secretary of Labor Fails to Gain Compromise.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—Miners' and operators' representatives today held out little hope that their meeting with Sec'y of Labor Wilson next Tuesday will result in averting the coal strike called for Nov. 1.

PUT PROGRAM UP TO CONFERENCE

The meeting here next Tuesday will be between miners' and operators' wage scale committees of the central competitive field, comprising Illinois, Indiana, Ohio and western Pennsylvania.
