

WOMEN'S VOTE CAUSES CONCERN

Right to Ballot in the Coming Presidential Election Question Still Undecided.

 WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 2.—Whether or not the federal woman suffrage amendment will be ratified in time to permit the women of the nation to vote at the presidential election next year is a close question. Many politicians have taken it for granted that it would be ratified in time, and have gone gunning after the votes of the women, but the latest developments seem to indicate that the amendment, if it gets through in time, is likely to do so by a mighty close shave.

Status of States.
 The following statement shows the status of the amendment in the state legislatures, together with an indication of the political control of each legislature:

States that have ratified: Arkansas, 100 per cent, democratic; Illinois, majority republican; Iowa, six to one, republican; Kansas, majority republican; Massachusetts, four to one, republican; Michigan, majority republican; Minnesota, majority republican; Missouri, majority republican; Montana, three to one, republican; Nebraska, eight to one, republican; New Hampshire, two to one, republican; New York, five to three, republican; Ohio, two to one, republican; Pennsylvania, eight to one, republican; Texas, 100 per cent, democratic; Utah, majority republican; Wisconsin, majority republican.

Train Kills Four Indiana Farmers

LAFAYETTE, Ind., Nov. 3.—Parker Laidlaw, 59, a farmer living near the state line, his 10-year-old daughter, Frank Hall of Ogden, a farm hand and Paul Adams, of State Line, a farmer, were instantly killed and Bert Adams, six years old, was seriously injured when a speeding Big Four passenger train struck the automobile in which they were riding a mile west of Covington at 4 o'clock Sunday afternoon. At the point at which the accident occurred there is a double track and when the party had crossed the first track they drove upon the second track without noticing the oncoming train.

SAYS PROFITEERS ARE MEANEST OF THIEVES

NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—Baptist churches throughout the country were urged to spurn money offered by profiteers, "the meanest kind of thieves," in a statement issued here tonight by Rev. Dr. Samuel Zane Batten, secretary of social service education for the American Baptist publication society.

"Every Baptist church should know whether any of its members are engaged in this nefarious business of profiteering," said Dr. Batten. "The church should refuse to touch the dirty money of these people. No self-respecting church would tolerate in its fellowship a person known to be guilty of highway robbery or horse stealing, and the sin of profiteering is meaner, blacker and more sinful than either of these. The church must make the will of God very plain on this subject."

HOLD PROHIBITION IS CAUSE OF RADICALISM

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—Prohibition is largely responsible for the "alarmingly increase" of radicalism in the United States, according to a statement last night by the Association Opposed to National Prohibition. This charge, it was asserted, is founded on an "investigation of conditions in eleven western states."

Claiming that unionism as a rule first pass resolutions demanding the return of beer and light wine and then turn to radical organizations, the statement asserts "all I. W. W. leaders are earnest advocates of prohibition."

The investigation, it was claimed, also disclosed that the number of drug addicts is vastly increased under prohibition and that corruption of politics is greater "since a new source of graft has been developed."

RUSS HOLD UP TRAIN: DEMAND YANKEE RIFLES

VLADIVOSTOK, Sunday, Oct. 26.—A train with part of a consignment of 89,000 rifles recently shipped from America for Admiral Kolchak, was held up at Tchita, Trans-Baikalia, on October 24 by Gen. Semenov, the anti-bolshevik leader in Siberia. Gen. Semenov demanded that 15,000 rifles be delivered to him by 11 o'clock on the morning of October 25 or force would be used to obtain them.

NORTHWESTER HITS NEW YORK CITY

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—A fierce northwest gale early Sunday tore 20 lighters and scows from their docks in Brooklyn and blew them down the harbor. Before they had been picked up by tugs several hours later, merchandise valued at \$69,000 had been blown from their decks, including coffee, sugar and telegraph and wireless equipment intended for American forces in Siberia.

PALMER SCORES COAL MEN OF NEW YORK FOR MAXIMUM PRICE STAND

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—Suggestion from the Wholesale Coal Trade association of New York that the government should not fix a maximum price for coal or interfere with the normal course of supply and demand during the strike brought from Aity. Gen. Palmer Sunday the vigorous assertion that he would take the same action against persons enhancing prices, as was taken against the union officers.

"The action of the government was taken solely in the general public interest," Mr. Palmer declared, "and I shall not permit it to be used directly or indirectly for the benefit of the employers' side of the controversy."

HAMBURG MEN IN STRANGE SOCIETY

Those Who Have Been Punished For Crime Form Association.

HAMBURG, Nov. 3.—A large number of those persons in Hamburg, who have been punished for crime, especially for technical violations of law, have banded together and formed a society termed the "Central Association of Previously Convicted Persons." It has established its own paper to represent its views, and intends to extend its membership all over Germany. Criminals guilty of serious crime will not be admitted. The following demands have been made on the government:

Immediate issue of an amnesty and the abolition of the death sentence.

Legal Code.

Rapid reorganization of the German legal code, with the advice of legally trained ex-convicts and representatives of the proletariat.

Exhaustive reorganization of the punishment of crime.

Abolition of military courts.

A law which obligates the state, the communes and the employers to give employment to convicted persons on equal terms with innocent persons.

RESENT MILITARY ORDER.

BERLIN, Saturday, Nov. 1.—There is much indignation among the industrial population of Munich as the result of a military order prohibiting the public celebration of the first anniversary of the German revolution which for Bavaria is Nov. 7. The trades unions, advised from Munich state, are threatening a general strike unless the order is rescinded.

BUDAPEST MONEY OF VARIED KIND

Denomination of Currency is Told by Color—Few Newspapers.

BERLIN, Nov. 3.—"Hardly has the train reached the East station than one notices the ageblatt's special Budapest correspondent. 'The chief station is a Rumanian officer, the station guard is composed of Rumanian soldiers, the arriving passengers are requested with friendly blows from clubs to stand in a long line and give the commanding Rumanian officer the travel pass.'"

"The baggage is minutely searched and it is more than an hour before it is possible to leave the station. It is almost impossible to get a cab, and if one does find one, the coachman immediately asks if one has 'blue money,' the old Austro-Hungarian bills in contradistinction to the 'white' money of the soviet regime.

"If one has the blue money the

ride throughout the entire city begins for lodging in a hotel is almost impossible to find, since nearly all are taken over by the entente missions and the Rumanian officers. It frequently happens that strangers spend days without a place to sleep in Budapest.

Streets Empty at Night.
 "Everywhere there are Rumanian patrols, including cavalry with lances and the Rumanian flag. The streets at night are absolutely empty, since no one without a special pass may be abroad after 11 o'clock. Only Rumanian soldiers are to be seen and with Hungarian troops may be hunting an occasional Bolshevik."

"In the day time automobiles tear through the streets carrying English, American, Italian and Rumanian officers. From the official buildings float the blue-yellow-red Rumanian flags. In front of the hotels where the officers live stand auto under military guard.

Life is liveliest in the Hotel Ritz, where lives the American commission, which made itself particularly popular by its attitude during the Jewish programs.

"An official declaration regarding the programs gives 12 dead and 409 wounded, one-third of whom however are not Jews. The anti-semitic movement is beginning to increase and has taken hold of these choirs. In the university, Professor Johann Ritook, one of the unknown great ones of the Hungarian scientific

world, has started on anti-semitic association which has as its task the clearing of the university of Jews. A whole list of European students are not to be allowed at the university in future. M., who was shot and fatally wounded today while piloting an automobile in the El Paso to Phoenix cross country race near Lanark, N. M., 16 miles west of here.

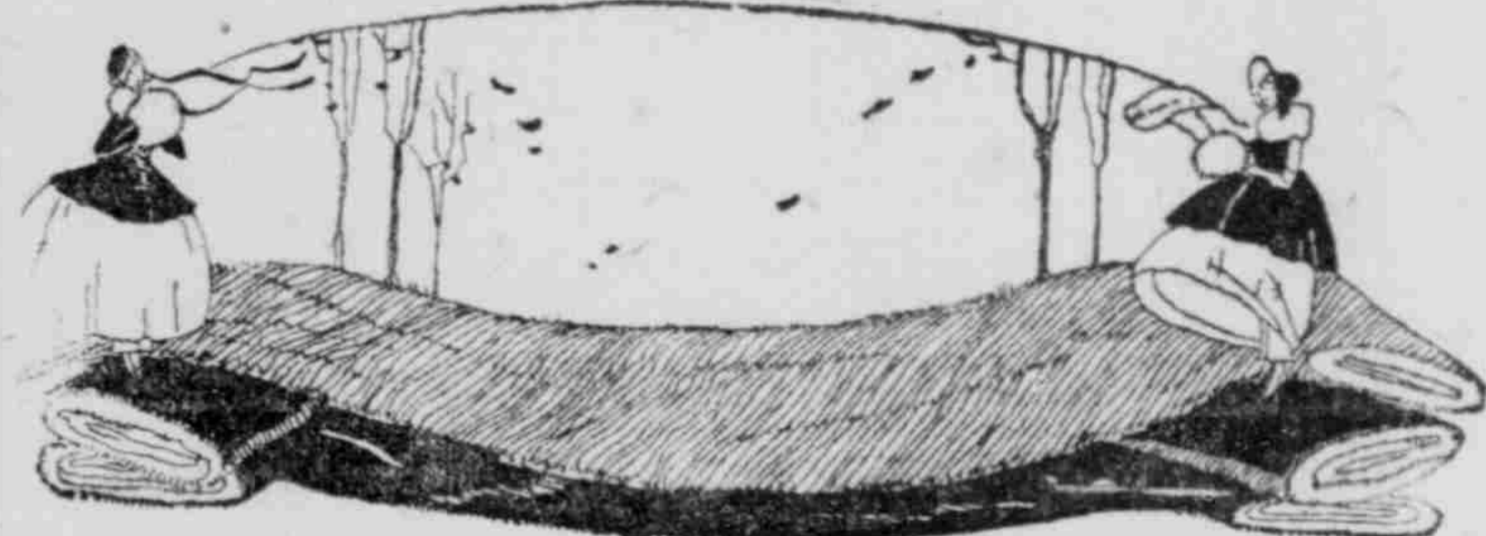
