HORSES ARE DYING WITH THE GLANDERS
It has been discovered that a number of horses in the grading camps in and about Gary have been dying of glanders. In all it is said that seven horses have become the victims of the disease.
When it is discovered that a horse has glanders, the only thing left to do is to shoot it and prevent the spread of the disease, which is very contagious.
An inspection of the various grading camps will be made by a veterinary and where horses are found to be afflicted with the disease they will be immediately killed.
Local horsemen are of the opinion that if the epidemic is not stopped soon there will be losses amounting to thousands of dollars in horses.
