WHEAT CROP HARVEST STARTED; FARMERS IN DOUBT ABOUT POOL

The Backbone road, between Fairhaven and Camden, began making 1921 wheat chop history on Friday. Two farmers got into their fields with their harvesters on the 17th, several days earlier than they were able to cut a year ago.

Harvesting Around Camden. Quite a bit of wheat is being cut today south of Camden. John White, of near Camden, began cutting wheat on Friday, and several machines were oiled up to begin on Saturday or Monday, although all fields are not yet ready for the sickle.

One Field Near Milton. The Milton Grain company said on Saturday morning that a farmer who came to town on Friday night said he had discovered some wheat in shock southwest of town, a few miles out, but did not know the farmer owning the crop.
