

# THE DIME "FLOP" PASSES IN WAKE OF PROHIBITION

### Workers With Bank Accounts Forces Closing of Army Hotels.

CHICAGO, Aug. 10.—Demand for private rooms, with sunshine and hot and cold running water, has supplanted that for a dime "flop" among wayfaring working men since the country went dry, according to the observations of the Salvation Army.

Lieutenant Colonel Emil Marcussen, head of the Industrial Department of the Army for the states west of the Mississippi, said today: "The day of the dormitory, or, more accurately, the 'dime houses' has passed. The kind of men who used to come to us seeking free beds or glad to get them for a dime, now ask for private rooms. Since prohibition became effective, they have closed several of our working men's hotels, including one in Chicago and another in Kansas City.

"There is a real need for good, modern hotels for men at reasonable prices, and those which we have are run along such lines. Our Working Men's Palace in Chicago has 771 beds. Three years ago, we would have found ten or twelve men in the Palace with bank accounts. Last month, there were 312 men in that hotel who carried bank books. In the old days, on cleaning out the dormitories where the transients slept we would find many empty bottles on the floor. Now it is very seldom that a bottle shows up. The story is the same in every city, from Chicago to the Pacific Coast.

"As for the Industrial homes, they used to contain many young men who ceased to be producers, and who had to be made over, sometimes by a long painstaking process, into good citizens and wage earners. Today there is hardly an able-bodied man in any Industrial home in the United States. "The men who are there are nearly all permanently disabled to some degree, or they are convalescents from hospitals who are unable to do an ordinary day's work. These men are not only able to take care of themselves, but even to save a little from their earnings. "There is room in every Industrial home. The Chicago home is not half full. That is why the Salvation Army is able this year, through its home service program, to extend an offer of the facilities of these homes to every small community in the West."

## FAMOUS OLD EPITAPHS TO GET BLUE PENCIL

LEIGHTON BUZZARD, England, Aug. 10.—"Here lies the body of Mary Ann Lowder, She burst while drinking a sedlitts powder.

Called from this world to her heavenly rest. She should have waited till it effervesced."

Tombstones in the tiny secluded church yards of this old-world place abound with epitaphs like the above and it is felt that in bygone days the rollicking country yokels buried their best beloveds with far too much mirth and levity.

The town clerk of Leighton Buzzard has been asked to confer with the chairman of the burial board with a view to censoring epitaphs. Hitherto the stonemason has carved the tombstones faithfully "according to copy," regardless of spelling and grammar, as evidenced by the following:

"Sacred to the memory of John Wardle and his wife and five children all of who passed away in their infancy."

Others, true, are philosophical without undue emotional display. The following masterpiece is traced on the tombstone of a long-deceased innkeeper:

"Our life is but a vintner's day. Some only breakfast and away. Others to dinner stay and are full fed.

The oldest man but sups and goes to bed. Large is his debt who lingers out the day. Who goes the soonest has the least to pay."

It is difficult to find a tombstone in Leighton Buzzard with a scriptural epitaph. The old, old gray stones, leaning against each other for support, depict the picture of human emotions, from the sanctimonious to the burlesque, but none of them have borrowed words of comfort from Matthew, Mark, Luke or John.

However, the town clerk has ordered a new office Bible, the chairman of the burial board is polishing up his scriptural quotations and Leighton Buzzard will have to learn to be orthodox.

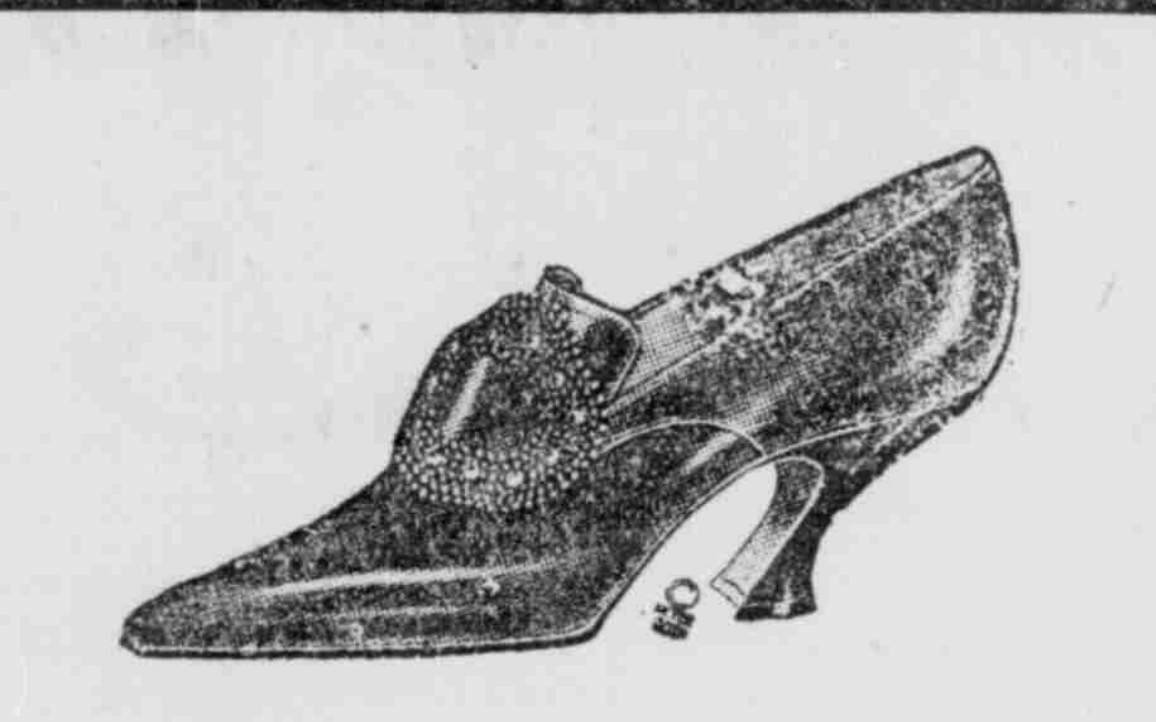
