

**REVENUE MEN TO CONFER HERE ON TAX SCHEDULES**

Collectors to Go Over Last Returns and Make Final Adjustments.

A conference of local internal revenue deputies, presided over by George G. Hess, acting deputy collector in charge of the South Bend division, is scheduled for Thursday morning in the federal building. With the last returns on the miscellaneous tax canvass turned in Tuesday, a course of special investigation into back income tax returns is expected to be the decision of the conferees.

Work on checking the income reports for 1931 as well as 1932 has not proceeded with much progress, owing to the urgent need of men in other fields of revenue activity, according to the acting director. Flagrant neglect exhibited by confectioners and other purveyors of ice cream and soft drinks during the early part of the year necessitated stern investigations, while check-up of special tax returns, the time limit on which expired July 31, has occupied the attention of the South Bend office, G. G. Hess announces.

Discrepancies in income returns, as well as actual evasions and misrepresentations have yet to be discovered in more than 75 per cent of forms handed in, the collector reports. Income tax returns, most of which were forwarded to Washington, have only recently returned to the South Bend office, delaying the work of revision to such an extent that no names beyond the "G's" have been passed upon, in the 1931 lot. It is said by the new deputy.

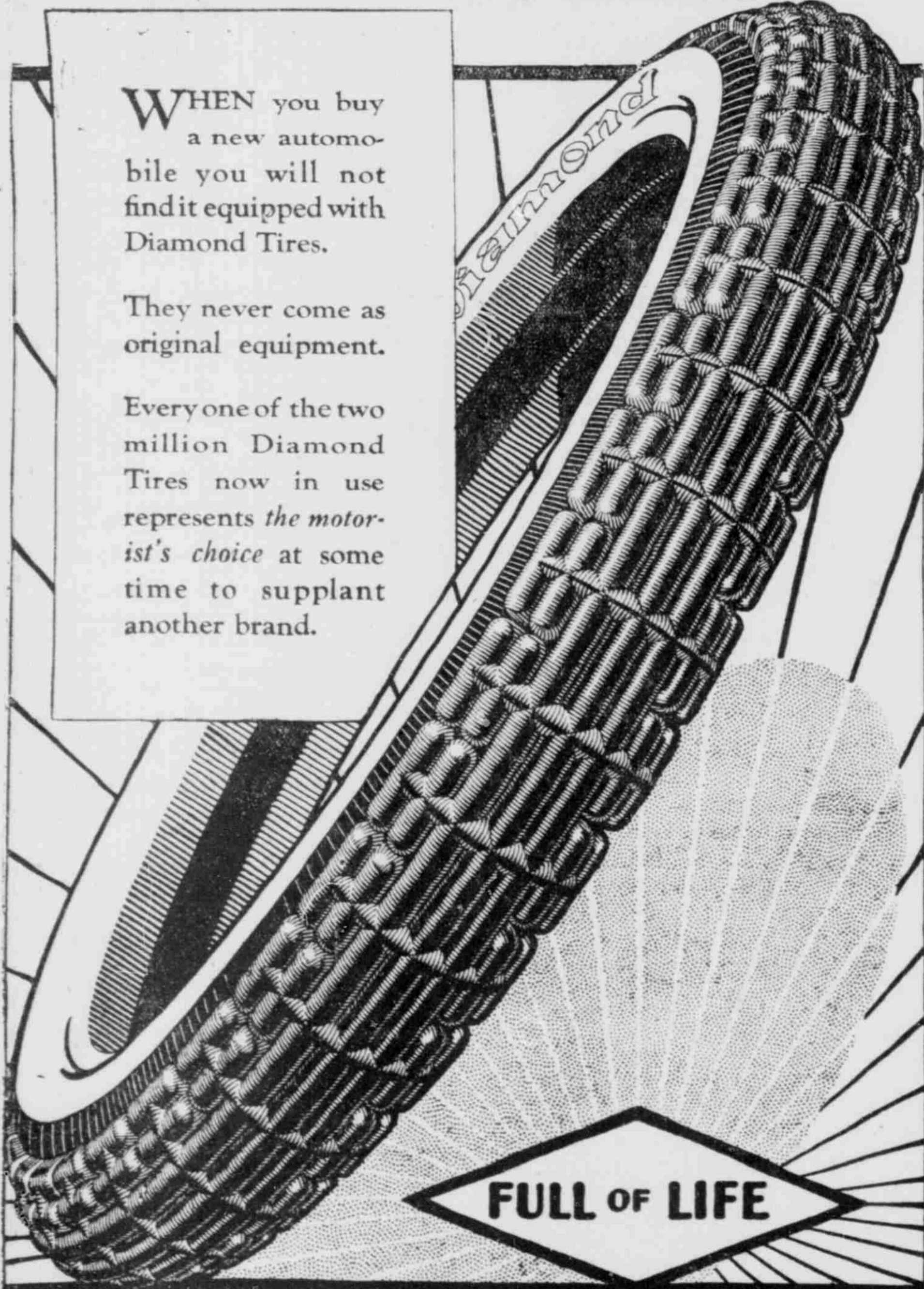
