Kills Wife and Daughter And Then Takes Own Life

By International News Service. SILVER SPRING, Ark., May 23.—After slaying his wife's throat with a razor R. B. Eaton, 45, a farmer residing near here, late yesterday shot to death his 13-year-old step-daughter and then ended his own life with the same weapon. The bodies were found today on the floor of the Eaton home.

A pleasing model is depicted at the left. The foundation is black velvet, which admirably sets off the vivid beauty of the pink-petalled roses that are embroidered on its surface.

Designed in two tiers, each is finished with handsome fringe. To the right is a shawl of heavy white crepe, whose dull surface proves an admirable foil for the flowers which are scattered upon its surface.
