Eds. Com.:—In your paper of yesterday I find the following paragraph in a dispatch from Indianapolis:

"Congressmen are at work in their Districts, stimulating the people to the striking point, except Julian, who, I learn, is stamping his District, attacking the Administration and its war policy, groaning over the enormous expenses and otherwise regarding enlistments. Don't Drink Much Water.

A person in good health, and in the moderate pursuit of business, does not feel like drinking water, even in summer time, if not very thirsty. In fact, great habitual thirst in summer is the sign of a depraved appetite, resulting from bad habits; or it is a proof of internal fever; and the indulgence of so simple a thing as drinking cold water largely in summer time, especially in the early part of the day, will produce a disordered condition of the system.

Most persons have experienced more or less discomfort from drink-

ing largely of cold water. If we drink a great deal, we must perspire a great deal; this perspiration induces a greater evaporation of heat from the surface than some have to spare; the result is a chill, then comes the reaction of fever. Many a person arises from dinner or tea table in June, chilly, because too much cold fluids have been taken. Those who drink little or nothing, even of cold water, in summer, till the afternoon, will be more vigorous, more full of health, and much more free from bodily discomfort, than those who place no restraint on their potations.

"Wouldn't do it," said the other.

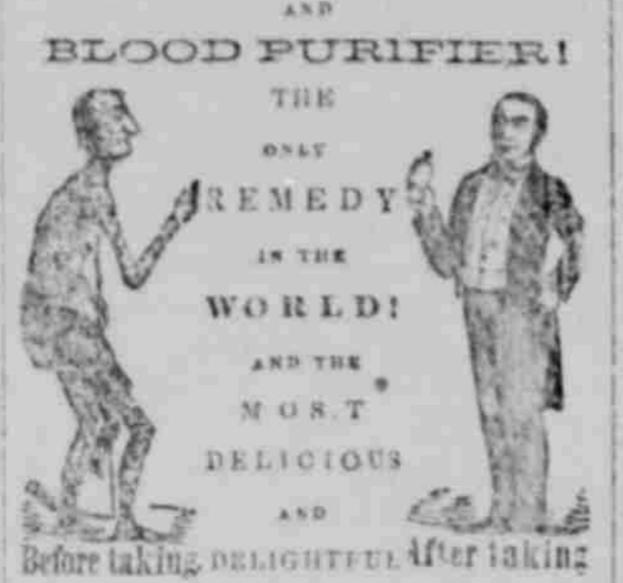
"Well why?"

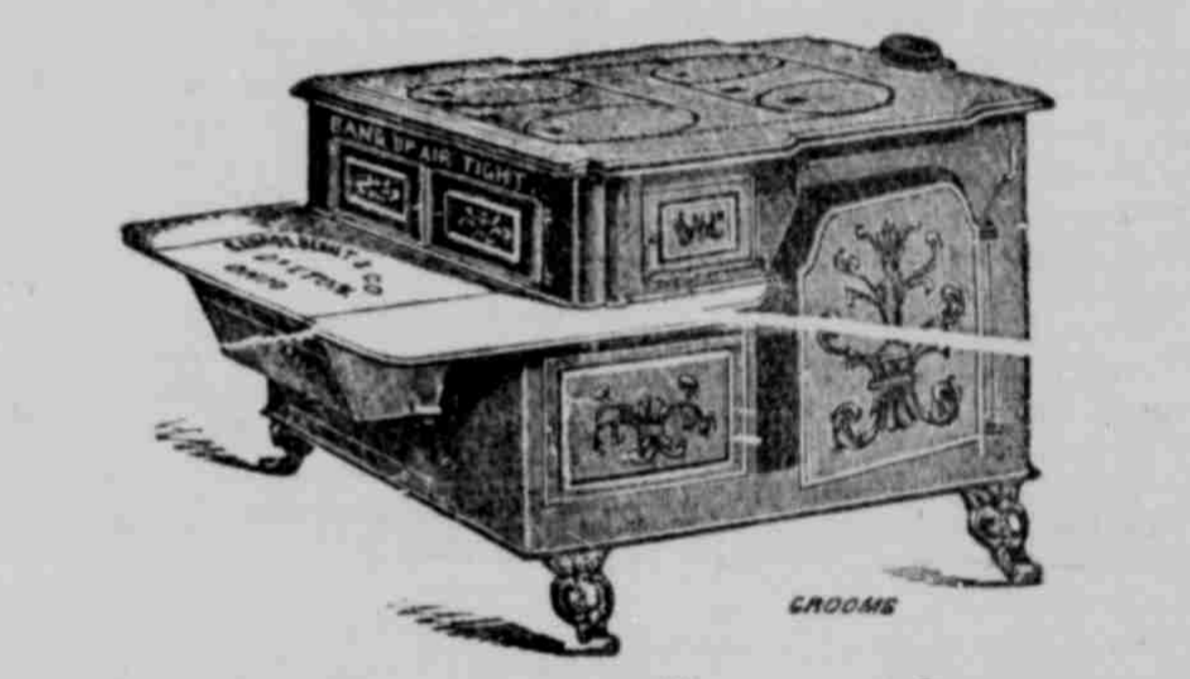
