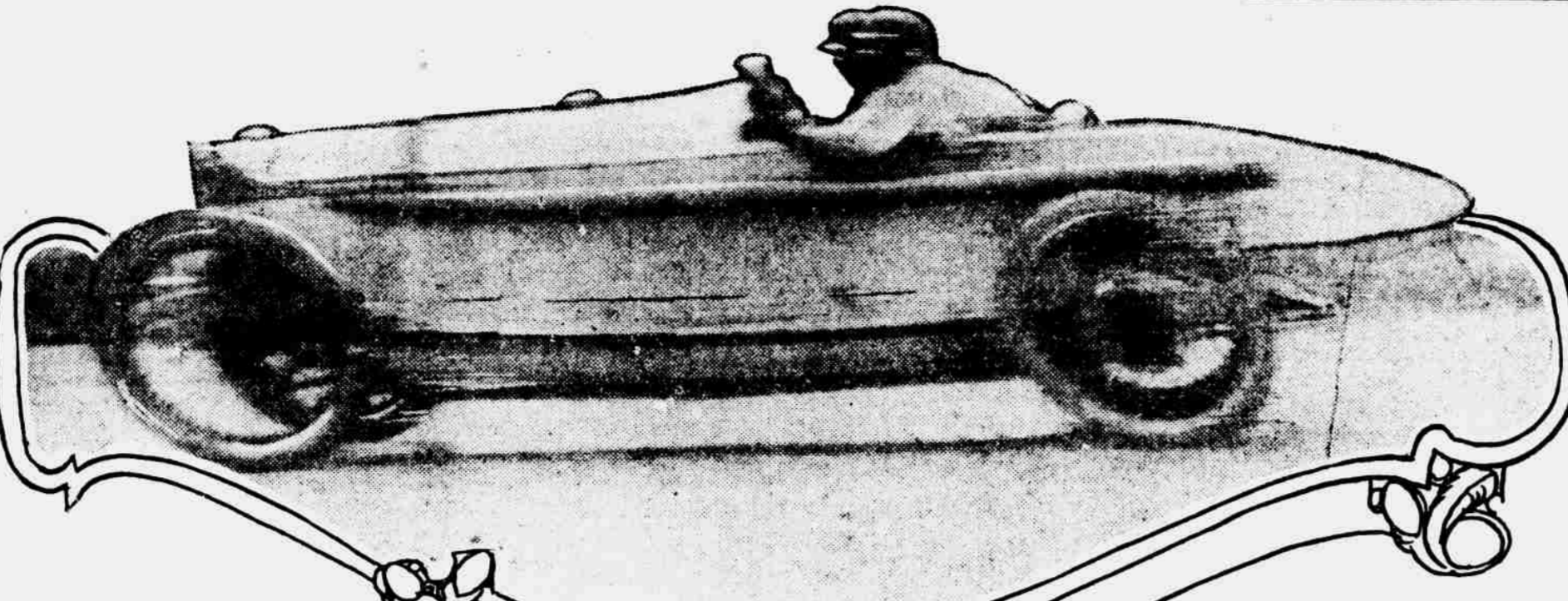

International Flavor of Indianapolis 500-Mile Race Will Be Present In the Next Big Fifty Thousand Dollar Sweepstakes Contest as Usual

With Father Time on the threshold of the next Indianapolis 500-mile race, May 29, the attention of the entire racing world is concentrating on that contest.

Even in the trenches of Europe, where battle scarred soldiers are ducking shot and shell, the outcome of the conflict will be eagerly awaited. Were it not for the fact that they are engaged in a sterner task, practically every European driver of note would now be in Indianapolis listening to the roar of motors and the bark of exhausts instead of the boom of cannon and the crackle of machine guns.

Even so, the international flavor of the next Indianapolis 500-mile race is far from lacking. Ten foreign cars, a third of the total field of final starters, are found among the contestants, with the most celebrated drivers of the old world and the new to drive.

Chief among the European delegation is Dario Resta, winner of the recent Vanderbilt and Grand Prize contests at San Francisco, with his Peugeot. He has a formidable rival, however, in Porporato, the Sunbeam pilot, who has been going great guns of late, and looks like a star performer.

There are DePalma, Borman, Oldfield, Chevrolet, Pullen, Cooper, Wilcox, Anderson, Bragg, and any number of others who must be figured in the run.

On the whole, the 500-mile race looks like a toss-up this year, with no one certain of a prize until after the contest is over. This is expected to produce one of the hardest-fought battles in history, every man straining himself to the utmost to outdistance his rivals. That the record will fall is thought almost certain.

ROOP LANDS BERTH WITH SOMERVILLE

Carl Roop has signed with the Somerville (Ohio) aggregation to finish the season as first twirler. Lefty Fox, who last year worked for the Rushville club and who was considered a high-class pitcher, was given an awful drubbing Sunday by the Hamilton Hoovers, and the Somerville management let him go.

Roop worked in the box for the New Paris team when it met the Ohio team two Sundays ago, and made a big hit with the followers of the team, who clamored for the club to sign him. His first engagement will be against the Vigrams, when they play a return engagement with Somerville Sunday. The Richmond team won the first game after eleven innings. Last Sunday, Roop, pitching for New Paris, held them scoreless, so the game should be every bit as good as the first one.

FOR MOTHER'S SAKE SPEEDWAY DIRECTOR WOULD BAR DAWSON

INDIANAPOLIS, May 25.—"If Joe Dawson attempts to drive in this year's 500-mile race I shall use every influence in my power to bar him from the track," says A. C. Newby, a director of the Indianapolis motor speedway, on which the big race will be held.

"Were Joe alone to be taken into consideration I might have no objection, but such is not the case. Every one knows the agonies Joe's mother endures every time he starts a contest, and I believe that after the ordeal she was forced to pass through last year, when her boy hovered between life and death for weeks, she is entitled to a rest.

"All the years that I was in the racing game (Newby had a string of National cars in contests for years) I never permitted a married man to drive for me. I figured no man had a right to gamble with the happiness of one as dear to him as his wife. In Dawson's case, I believe mothers should be included in the list, though, of course, ordinarily every man must be left to settle such matters for himself."

Newby's statement, coming from a man who is financially interested in the racing game, is epoch making. It foreshadows the time when commercialism will be a secondary feature in every sport, as long as that sport is strong enough to be self-supporting.
