Bates on the Western Reserve.

If Edward Bates will be acceptable to the people of the Western Reserve, he will be to extreme free soilers everywhere. The great fear has been that these people might bolt his nomination. We do not believe they will.

We notice that a correspondent of the St. Louis Democrat, writing from the Reserve, says that he has traveled over the greater part of that section, and finds that Judge Bates is the choice of a large portion of the voters.

At a club meeting of the Republicans of Cleveland last week, there were several speeches made in favor of Edward Bates upon the grounds of his conservative principles, staunch and upright character, and non-corruption of demagoguism.

His letter, answering the interrogations of the Missouri delegation to the Chicago Convention, spreads like wild-fire, and "takes superbly." Many of the "ranked abolitionists" are becoming conservative, and throw up their hats for Judge Bates, since the publicity of his letter; it is doing a fine work in the Northern States.

We have just been talking with an old settler of Lorain county, who lives within a few miles of Oberlin, the hot-bed of Abolitionism. He is intimately acquainted with public sentiment up there, and says that if Mr. Bates should be nominated at Chicago, he will be supported by the Republicans of the Reserve.

The Trenton Democrat says that New Jersey can be triumphantly carried for Bates. There were five hundred and seventy convicts in the State prison at Jeffersonville on the 24th.
