They Are Now Receiving the Postem Treatment at a Hospital at Pittsburg.

### FATHER FIRST TO SUCCUMB

THE OTHERS LIVE IN CONSTANT DREAD THAT THE NEXT HOUR MAY FIND THEM IN THROES OF HYDROPHOBIA.

[Publishers' Press.] Pittsburg, Pa., Jan. 15.—Living in constant fear that the next hour may find them in the throes of hydrophobia, remembering the struggles of husband and father, who died last week a victim of a mad dog's bite, a whole family is receiving the Pasteur treatment at a hospital in this city in the hope that medical science can save them from certain death. The six persons taking the treatment are Alice Black, her two sons, Dean and Howard, and daughter, Mrs. Eulo Owings, the husband of Mrs. Owings, and D. S. Gordon, all of Hanlon, Pa., where Mr. Black died of hydrophobia several days ago. Howard Black was bitten by the same dog that caused his father's death, but the attending physicians ordered all who helped care for the dying man to come to Pittsburg and take the treatment, as it is said they are in great danger.

### GIRL PUSHED UNDER CAR WORK OF HUMAN BEASTS

Mad Rush for Street Car Results in Death of Lillian Dahike in Chicago —A Complete Tie-Up of Elevated Cars.

[Publishers' Press.] Chicago, Jan. 15.—Thousands of persons were forced to walk to work by a complete tie-up of elevated trains in the loops district. Many passengers alighted from the stalled cars and walked along the elevated structure to the nearest station. The blockade was the indirect cause of fatal injuries sustained by Miss Lillian Dahike, 19. In company with many other people, Miss Dahike was standing on the platform at Canal street and when the first train stopped she was pushed from the platform in the rush to board the cars. She fell between the train and the platform in such a way that it was found necessary to chop a portion of the platform to extricate her.

### DEFEATED IN THE HOUSE COMMITTEE

Senate Ship Subsidy Bill Killed By Narrow Margin of Eight to Seven.

### DEMOCRATS VOTED FOR IT

FINANCE COMMITTEE VOTES FAVORABLY UPON NOMINATIONS FOR SECRETARY OF INTERIOR AND TREASURY.

Washington, Jan. 15.—By a vote of eight to seven the senate ship subsidy bill was defeated in the house committee on merchant marine and fisheries. As the committee had no authority to sit during the sessions of the house, and as objection was made to granting this authority, a vote on the Grosvenor mail subsidy substitute was prevented and the committee adjourned to meet at the close of the day's session. The Democratic members of the committee generally voted for the senate bill, and its defeat was accomplished by Republican members. The senate committee on finance agreed to report favorably the nominations of Postmaster General Cortelyou to be secretary of treasury and James R. Garfield, commissioner of corporations, to be secretary of interior. The vote on both was unanimous, members of the committee assenting to the view that the president should be allowed to select his own advisers. The committee also agreed to recommend the confirmation of Arthur S. Statter of Washington to be assistant secretary of treasury.

The house after passing a few measures of local interest resumed consideration of the fortification bill. Senator Spooner resumed his discussion of the Brownsville resolution, his speech on this subject having been interrupted by adjournment. He said he agreed that it is for congress to determine the oath of enlistment of land and sea forces, the duration of term, the pay, the method of punishment and many other regulations for the government of the soldiers, but he could not agree that the commander-in-chief is in time of peace or war under the supreme control of congress. The constitution makes the president commander-in-chief of the army without defining his functions, declared Spooner. He read from a decision in the Swayne case in the court of claims that congress can reduce the military forces, but so long as there is a force the commander-in-chief is supreme. This decision set forth the view that the powers of congress and the powers of the commander-in-chief are supreme, and that one can not encroach on the power of the other.

Greenboro, N. C., Jan. 15.—Judge Boyd, in United States court, appointed Charles Come of this city receiver for the Odell Manufacturing company, a big cotton mill at Concord, N. C. The complaint asking for the receiver was filed by attorneys representing the Continental Color and Chemical company of New York and other creditors. The liabilities are given as \$500,000, and assets estimated at \$1,000,000. This action is said to be a direct result of the failure of three big mills at Bessemer City, in which stockholders of this company are interested. The receiver is authorized to continue operating the mill.
