Cincinnati, O., Nov. 18.—The C. H. & D. R. R. has purchased the Findlay, Ft. Wayne & Western railroad running from Findlay, O., to Ft. Wayne, Ind., 78 miles. Negotiations were concluded today in New York.

Likely Caught a Bank Robber.

Huntington, W. Va., Nov. 18.—An unknown man was arrested this morning on suspicion of being a bank robber. He has a deep gash across

the nose and apparently a fresh gunshot wound in his left hand. A thousand dollars in money was sewed into his undershirt. He refuses to talk.

The Hay-Pauncefote Treaty Signed.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 18.—The new Hay-Pauncefote treaty was signed today by Secretary Hay for the United States and Lord Pauncefote for Great Britain.

ACCIDENT

At the Municipal Electric Light Plant.

Dirt in Dainty Carpets.

For housewives who pride themselves upon the spotless floor coverings The Druggists' Circular gives the following recipe for removing spots of dirt from carpets:

Make a suds with a good white soap and hot water and add fuller's earth to this until the consistency of thin cream. Have plenty of clean drying cloths, a small scrubbing brush, a large sponge and a pail of fresh water. Put some of the cleaning mixture in a bowl and dip the brush in it. Brush a small piece of the carpet with this; then wash with the sponge and cold water. Dry as much as possible with the sponge and finally rub with dry cloths. Continue this till you are sure that all the carpet is clean; then let it dry.

A Park Theater, and Athletic Field on the Intervale.
