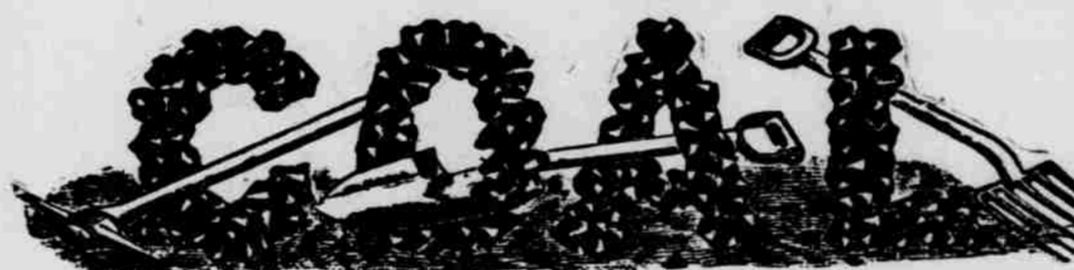

MICAJAH CHAMNESS DEAD

Wealthy Alexandria Recluse Who Lived in Fear of Robbery.

Alexandria, Ind., March 16.—Micajah Chamness, eighty-five years old, an aged recluse of this place, is dead at his home here. He leaves five children in this city, all well-to-do. Although possessed of much wealth, Mr. Chamness refused to live anywhere save in a little hut, which he had entirely surrounded with a rail fence, ten feet high, owing to his hallucination that everybody was trying to get his money. As an additional precaution, he was guarded by two great St. Bernard dogs, which also accompanied him in his hunting trips, of which sport he was very fond. His hut was lined with 'coon, 'possum and fox hides, while his bed consisted of a large buffalo robe. His wife died more than twenty-five years ago, and since then Mr. Chamness has refused to make his home with his children, seemingly not contented with any life save that of a recluse.
