REUBEN MYRICK LEAVES BANK

AFTER BEING ASSOCIATED WITH IT THIRTY-TWO YEARS.
FIRST NAT'L OFFICIALS Pass Resolutions and Make Mr. Myrick a Substantial Present.

About a month ago Mr. Reuben Myrick resigned his position in the First National bank of this city. The directors were loth to accept the resignation and asked him to continue in service for a month longer at least. This Mr. Myrick consented to do, and the month expired last night and today the board accepted the resignation. The action of Mr. Myrick is of his own volition and was not only not thought of but never considered for a minute. The directors at their meeting expressed regret at Mr. Myrick's action and commended him for the excellent service he has rendered the institution during the thirty-two years he has been connected with it.
Mr. Myrick's resignation causes some shifting of help in the bank. Mr. Calvert takes Mr. Myrick's place for a while and Mr. Frank Taylor of the Greensfork bank, came to the First National today.

The bank officials have only the kindest feelings for Mr. Myrick. He is not only a competent accountant but one of the most affable of gentlemen.
Mr. Myrick's future occupation has not been determined upon as yet, as he desires to take a rest from business cares for a time. As a token of appreciation the directors passed suitable resolutions and also made him a very substantial present.

hurried into the house and the son went up stairs and found his father dead, and lying in a pool of his own blood.

The family were beside themselves with excitement and at once called Coroner Markley. He made a thorough investigation from which he deduced the following facts: Kelley was drinking and dependent and having trouble as he stated to his family went up stairs for the purpose of taking his own life which he did successfully. He held the revolver in his left hand, with the muzzle placed in the left ear. The bullet took an upward course and passed out through the top of his head. From an indentation in the center of his forehead he made an attempt to shoot himself through the brain, but the bullet missed its mark and went in another direction.
Jacob Kelley was an employe of the city working about the streets. He was a soldier and a member of Sol Meredith Post G. A. R. He leaves a wife and seven children.

The suicide, like all such affairs, is deplorable. When not in liquor the deceased was kind and considerate, and provided for his family as best he could. The family have the sympathy of their many friends in their hour of affliction.
