WORDS OF PEACE

President Roosevelt Not a Man Who Loves Strife.

Every man, and especially every man in high official position, is entitled to be judged by his deliberate official utterances, not by the forced construction which his enemies can place upon distorted and garbled extracts. In his two Messages to the fifty-seventh Congress President Roosevelt used these words: "The Monroe Doctrine . . . is in no wise intended as hostile to any nation in the Old World. Still less is it intended to give cover to any aggression by no New World power at the expense of any other. It is simply a step, and a long step, toward assuring the universal peace of the world by securing the possibility of permanent peace on this hemisphere."

"The true end of every great and free people should be self-respecting peace, and this nation most earnestly desires sincere and cordial friendship with all others."

"More and more the civilized peoples are realizing the wicked folly of war and are attaining that condition of just and intelligent regard for the rights of others which will in the end as we hope and believe, make world-wide peace possible."

"As civilization grows warfare becomes less and less the normal condition of foreign relations."

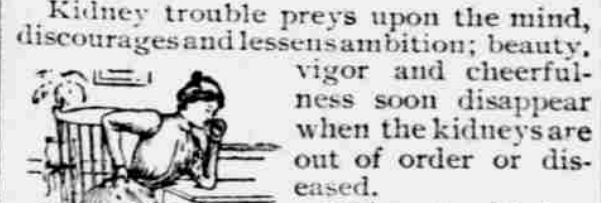
"Wherever possible arbitration or some similar method should be employed in lieu of war to settle difficulties between civilized nations."

"By a mixture of prudence and firmness with wisdom we think it is possible to do away with much of the provocation and excuse for war, and at least in many cases to substitute some other and more rational method for the settlement of disputes."

And in his address at Waukesha, Wis., April 3, 1903, he said: "We want friendship; we want peace. We wish well to the nations of mankind. We look with joy at any prosperity of theirs; we wish them success, not failure."

These are not mere fragmentary and accidental expressions, not exceptional outbreaks of sentiment, removed from their connection and at variance with the general drift of his opinion. They give the keynote which controls the harmony of his entire policy, which he has embodied in deeds as well as words. What verdict shall we render, then, as to those who have been guilty of the enormous libel that represents their author as a man enamored of strife, who loves war, and is happy only when he contemplates the opportunity of embroiling his own people in conflict and bloodshed? We do not commend the forger; we refuse to trust the man who alters the face of a note; we count as criminals they who misrepresent others that they may deceive the innocent or the uninformed for their own aggrandizement. And the commission of like crime in politics does not injure the one thus falsely accused; it demonstrates the utter unworthiness of the party that would gain by such forbidden and abhorrent means.
