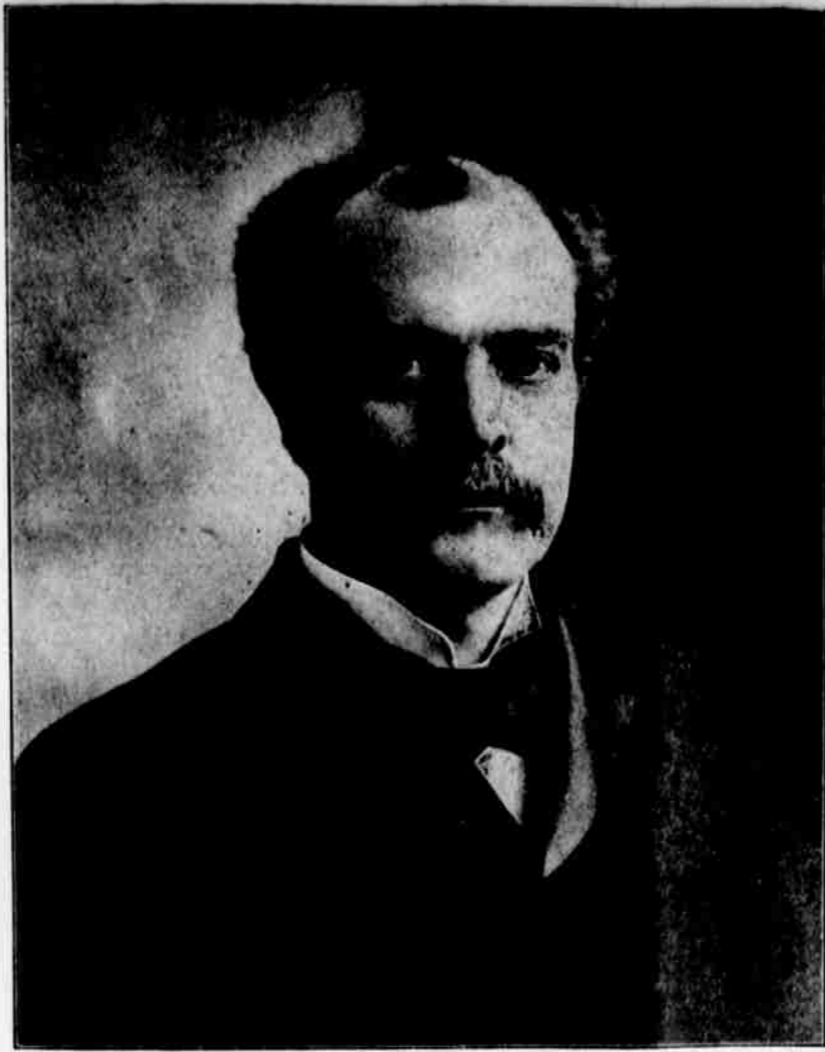

The failure of the former village clerk to file in the County court a certificate showing the result of an annexation has a tendency to invalidate the proceedings. Assistant Corporation Counsel W. K. Otis is prepared to ask the courts to permit this certificate to be filed now.

Refusal of the courts yesterday to grant an injunction restraining the city from taking possession of the municipal properties of the former village of Morgan Park cleared the atmosphere in regard to that part of the city. Representatives of the city government went to the suburb Tuesday morning and took over all of the property formerly controlled by the former village board.

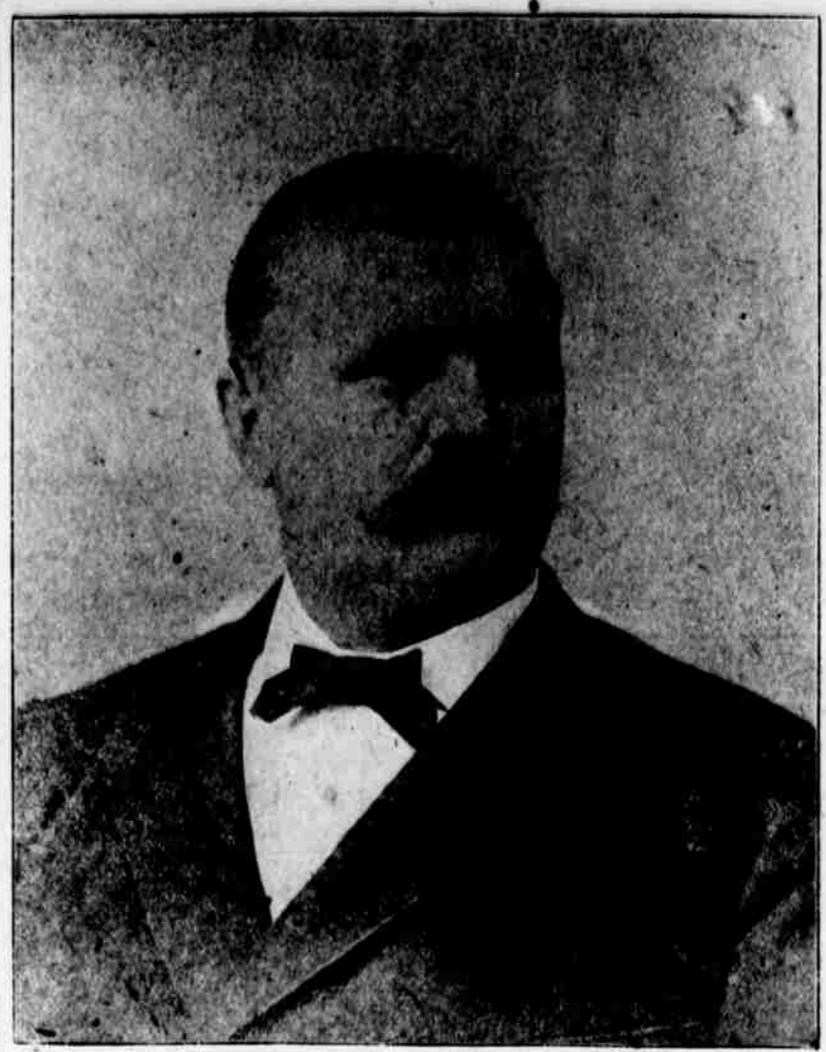

There is a general demand for the abolition of boulevards.

They are maintained exclusively for the rich at the expense of the poor.

They are used exclusively by persons owning automobiles and are kept up by the taxes of people who do not live upon them.

When people of moderate means were enabled to own and enjoy the driving of horses, the boulevards were the delight of the common people.

It is different now.

People who live upon streets that are not boulevards can only have them improved by putting their hands in their pockets and paying for the improvements themselves.

All property upon streets not boulevard is subject to the levy of special assessments for the improvement and maintenance of such thoroughfares.

Property fronting on boulevards is not subject to special assessment.

The improvement of boulevards and the maintenance of these costly luxuries is paid for out of the park taxes levied upon the general tax payer, who reaps no benefit from his outlay.

Trees upon boulevards are maintained out of the general park taxes, levied upon all taxpayers.

While the general taxpayer pays for

Sent a communication from Dr. E. Christiansen, asking that apartment building owners be forced to put screens on their structures to keep out flies, to the committee on health.

Passed an ordinance empowering the commissioner of public works to issue a voucher to George W. Jackson, Inc., for \$17,500, as part of the reserve fund for the building of the southwest land tunnel. The money is to be used to satisfy damage suit claims brought by relatives of persons who lost their lives in the intermediate crib disaster.

Referred Alderman Murray's resolution asking for the creation of a commission to study street cleaning problems to the judiciary committee.

Approved the bonds of former Mayor Busse for coal yards and switch tracks at Fleetwood street and West North avenue.

Several improvement ordinances providing for the reconstruction of streets and sewers also were passed.

Bonds were given and accepted by the Council by the chief of police and

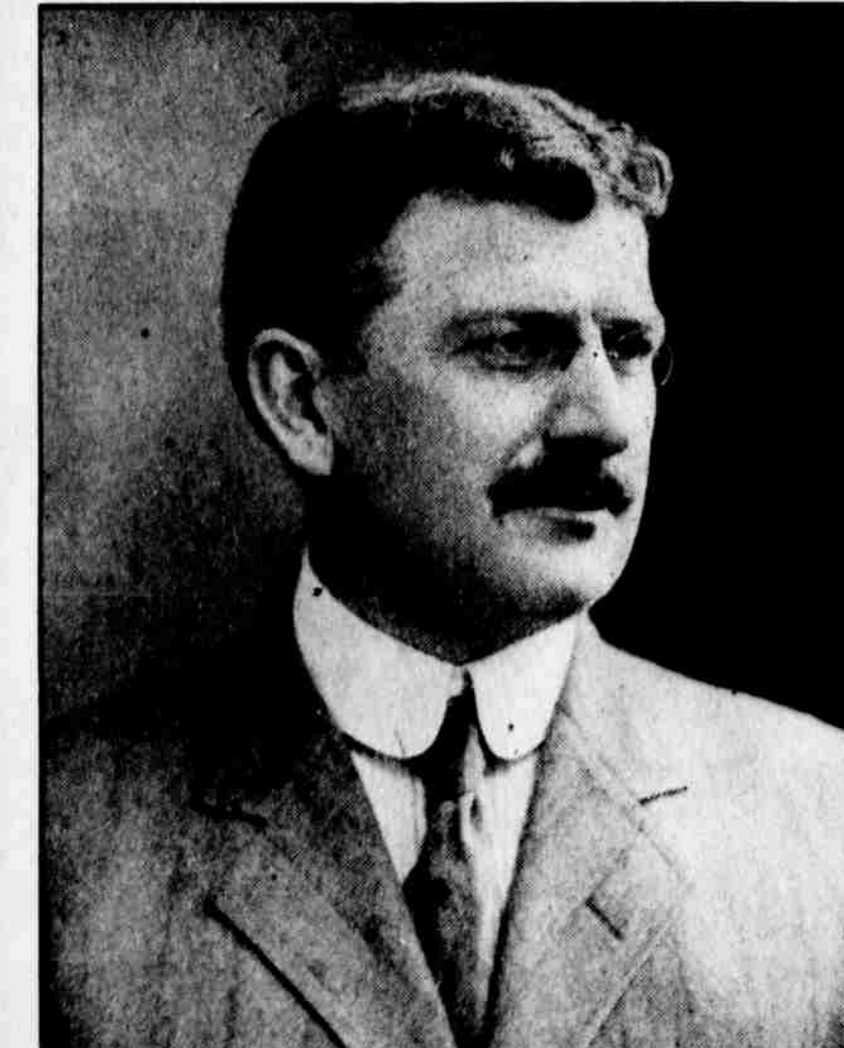
fire marshal in the sum of \$25,000 each, by the city collector in the sum of \$250,000, the deputy commissioner of public works and all the members of the board of local improvements in the sum of \$25,000 each, inspectors of gas and oil \$25,000 each and the chief boiler inspector \$5,000.

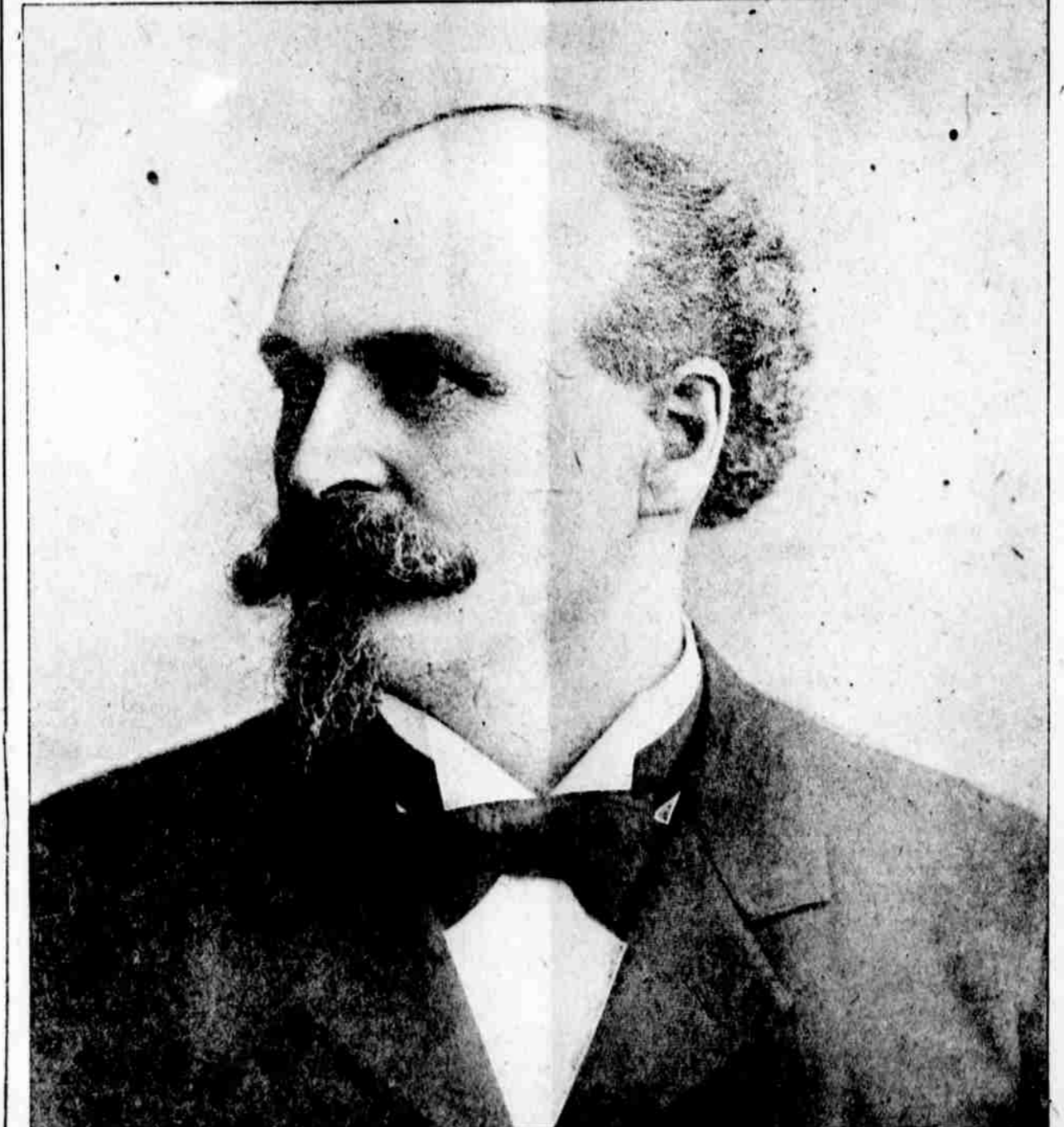
Receipts in the Chicago postoffice for April were \$120,716.70 more than for April, 1910, according to the report made by Postmaster D. A. Campbell Tuesday. The total receipts were \$1,602,493.36 against \$1,481,775.66 in April, 1910, an increase of 8.15 per cent.
