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FIND MAN'S BODY IN CREEK

The quietness of this little village was rudely broken last Monday morning and the citizens thrown into a dither of excitement by a gruesome discovery by a little child on its way to school.

As the child wended its way to school it happened to glance toward the creek and what it saw sticking up from the murky waters was a "creepy" sight—a part of an arm and a hand upraised as if in a silent appeal for help—help that did not come.

The child gave the alarm and the police were notified by Mrs. Cora Bryant of 13705 Albany avenue.

The body attached to the arm and hand was that of Willie Riles, 41, who had last been seen Saturday night. He was then on his way home, reports say.



Ike's Box Score

ONLY 5 OUT OF 214 RECOMMENDATIONS BECOME LAWS

By the official tabulation of the progress made by the Republican Party under President Eisenhower and his administration, I am reminded of the words so often used in a wedding ceremony, "for better or for worse." Here is the box score as of today:

With the 83rd Congress' 2nd session about half over, five of President Eisenhower's 214 recommendations have been enacted into laws; 169 have made little or no progress at all. The first installment of this score covers the first quarter congressional action (thru March 31 program) after the President stated on December 2 that "the Republican Party must enact in order to deserve to remain in power."
