### Jenkins To Be First Negro on Labor Board

Washington, July 23

Howard Jenkins Jr. Monday said he is deeply grateful to President Kennedy for picking him as a member of the National Labor Relations Board.

If the nomination is approved by the Senate, Jenkins will be the first Negro to serve on the board.

"The position offers a chance to work in an area of the public service which has long engaged my interests and efforts," Jenkins said in a statement.

"I believe that we will move ahead as a united people more readily when we weigh carefully all matters which can affect our economy through the cooperative efforts of labor and management."

Jenkins, a native of Denver, Colo., is a 48-year-old former professor of law. He now is assistant commissioner of the Bureau of Labor-Management Reports.
