CHARLES JAMES FOLGER.

The Secretary of the Treasury Department Dies in the Harness.

Overwork and Too Close Application to Details of His Office Responsible for His Untimely Death.

Brief Resume of the Dead Secretary's Political Career—The Department Closed To-day.

GENEVA, N. Y., September 5.—Hon. Charles J. Folger, Secretary of the Treasury of the United States, died at his home here at 4:45 yesterday afternoon.

He had been prostrate from overwork for several weeks, and his friends were not prepared for the news of his death.

He graduated with honor at the Geneva College in 1836, and soon after commenced the study of law in Canandaigua.

In 1844 he was appointed Judge of the Ontario Court of Common Pleas, and was also made Master and Examiner in Chancery, which positions he held until the Chancery Court was abolished in 1846.

In 1851 he was elected County Judge of Ontario County, and held that office four years.

In 1869 President Grant appointed him United States Sub-Treasurer at New York, which office he held until 1879, when he was elected Judge of the Court of Appeals.

In October, 1881, he was appointed Secretary of the Treasury, for which office he qualified on November 14, and held it at the time of his death.

The Department in Mourning.

WASHINGTON, D. C., September 5.—The heads of bureaus of the Treasury Department met this morning, and Comptroller Lawrence, Commissioner Johnston, Treasurer Wyman, Commissioner Evans, and Solicitor Neal were appointed a committee to draft resolutions of respect to the memory of Secretary Folger.

The Sheephead Bay Races.

New York, September 4.—The excellent programme of the third day of the autumn meeting at Sheephead Bay brought together a large assemblage.

First Race—Two-year-olds; three-fourths mile: Florio, first; Ma Chero, second; Natalie, third. Time, 1:16 3/4.

Second Race—Three-year-olds and upwards; one mile: Checkmate, first; Rica, second; Arsenic, third. Time, 2:16.

Third Race—The September stakes for three-year-olds; one and three-fourths miles: Louise, first; Blast, second; Economy, third. Time, 3:07 1/4.

Fourth Race—Handicap sweepstakes for all ages; one and five-eighths miles: Monitor, first; Nettle, second; Markland, third. Time, 2:50 3/4.

Fifth Race—All ages; one and one-eighth miles: Frank Runyan, first; Monk, second; Prescott, third. Time, 1:58 1/2.

Sixth Race—Handicap steeplechase over full course: Cochran, first; Altaire, second; Disturbance, third. No time given.

Hampden Park Races.

SPRINGFIELD, MASS., September 5.—Another cloudless sky, superb track, and attractive programme, drew the largest crowd of the meeting to the third day of the Hampden Park Association's fall meeting.

The postponed 2:17 pacing race, purse \$1,000, had only two starters, and was won by three straight heats by Bessie M.; Lorenz, second. Best time, 2:18 1/2.

The 2:14 trotting class race, purse \$1,000 divided, had three starters, and was won by Harry Wilkes, who took the third, fourth and fifth heats; Phillips, second; Majolica, who won the first heat, being drawn in third. Best time, 2:15, by Harry Wilkes, lowering his record of 2:16 1/2 made at Buffalo this season.

This is the second time 2:15 has been made on Hampden Park track, the first being two years ago, by St. Julien.

In the free-for-all pacing class race, purse \$1,100, divided, there were three starters, and Westmont won in three straight heats; Jewett, second in each heat and race; Billy S., third. Best time, 2:14.

A Pacing Race.

MINNEAPOLIS, MINN., September 5.—Twelve thousand persons witnessed the pacing race for \$5,000 between Johnston and Ribball yesterday. Splan drove Johnston, and John S. Campbell, Ribball.

The weather was fine and the track good. Johnston won the first heat, in 2:13, Ribball the second in 2:20 3/4, and Johnston the third and race in 2:17 1/4.
