Two Men Hanged.

Cincinnati Refuses to License Social Evil.

Building Monuments to the Dead.

A Specimen of a Carpet-Bag Judge.

The Joke on Rock Island Saloon Keepers.

Is County Tax Collector an Office?

WAUKEGAN, Feb. 28.—Christopher Rafferty was hanged in jail here at 1 o'clock this afternoon, for the murder of Policeman O'Meara in Chicago, August 24th, 1872. He died easily, without a struggle. Only the legal jury and officials were present.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Feb. 27.—Keene, the murderer of Valentine, was hanged this morning. He confessed the crime.

CINCINNATI, Feb. 27.—In the City Council to-day an ordinance to license the social evil was defeated by a vote of 15 to 7.

JACKSONVILLE, Ill., Feb. 27.—The National Crop Reporter returns from the States of Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, Minnesota, Missouri and Wisconsin, that it estimates that the number of hogs fattening in those States for summer packing is fifty per cent. less than last year.

SPRINGFIELD, Feb. 26.—The Senate this evening took up for disposal the bill appropriating \$50,000 to the Huntington monument at Chicago. Mr. Whiting wanted it so amended as to appropriate the same amount for the building of a monument to Owen Lovejoy. Mr. Palmer opposed the bill because David A. Gage, the defaulter, is mentioned as one of the commissioners. Mr. Dow explained that Gage has expressed an intention of resigning immediately, should the bill pass. Mr. Hampton wanted the bill killed as an unjustifiable expenditure of the State funds. In consideration of the fact that numerous friends of the bill were absent, further consideration was made a special order for to-morrow at half-past ten.

SPRINGFIELD, Feb. 27.—In the Senate to-day the bill appropriating \$50,000 for the Douglas monument was lost by a vote of 18 to 19. A special committee of five—Yeager, Dow, Steele, Casey and Brown—was appointed to draw up a bill of amendment. The Senate revision bill concerning State contracts was passed. The amendments of the Judiciary Committee to the husband and wife bill were concurred in and the bill ordered to a third reading.

In the House the Paine contempt case was settled by the witness promising to testify, and he was purged of contempt. The Agricultural Department bill was amended so as to prohibit the sale of liquor within two miles of fair grounds and ordered to a third reading.

BLOOMINGTON, Ill., Feb. 26.—The testimony in the trial of Jerry Shannon and Thomas Barrett for murder at Low Point, Livingston County, last August, was concluded this afternoon. The opening speech for the prosecution was made by Mr. Grant of Pontiac, who spoke for nearly two hours, giving a clear synopsis of the testimony. He was followed by Lawrence Harmon of Peoria, in an eloquent and logical speech for the defense. The trial will be resumed in the morning, when the speeches of State's Attorney Filer of Bloomington, for the prosecution, and W. O'Brien of Peoria, for the defense, will be made. It is thought Shannon will be acquitted.

JACKSONVILLE, Ill., Feb. 27.—The Sheriff of this county claims that he is entitled to commissions on taxes collected by him as an ex officio collector, in addition to the salary fixed by the County Board under the new Constitution, and has retained some \$5,000 or 6,000, and the amount of said commissions for the past year. The County Court will soon institute a suit to recover the fees so retained by the Sheriff.

NEW YORK, February 27.—A Washington dispatch says that Mrs. Myra Clarke Gaines of New Orleans, has been before the sub-committee in the case of Judge Durell, and that her testimony is regarded as of such a character as to require the prompt presentation of the articles of impeachment against Durell. It seems that a conversation about Durell with her lawyer, Stone, who said: "He (Durell) will sit upon your cases and decide in your favor upon certain conditions, which are that Sheriff Parker retains in his hands \$21,000 for making streets in the property litigated for by the Union Company, the heirs of Cavalier and Day and report and Mrs. Gaines. Durell can arrange it, if you will give him \$20,000, \$9,000 (you can have the remainder) to be given to the above-named heirs, and every other lot in the two squares designated may be taken, and to children afflicted with worms, and even adults who suffer from this cause, ignorant of the fact—and their numbers are millions—it is the greatest remedy of the age. CINCINNATI, Feb. 27.—Swift & Co., proprietors of rolling mills at Newport, Ky., telegraphed Gov. Leslie for protection to-day to enable them to resume work, also, to the Secretary of War for a guard of soldiers to protect the boats they are building for the government from interference of the strikers.

CINCINNATI, Ohio, Feb. 27.—A fire at Galveston, Ind., yesterday, burned the dry goods store of J. Conwell. Loss \$10,000; insurance \$6,000.

Bryson & Co.'s distillery at Portsmouth, Ohio, was partially burned this morning. The distillery was valued at \$50,000; no insurance.

Special Telegram to the Chicago Tribune.

ROCK ISLAND, Ill., Feb. 26.—The report telegraphed from here by some irresponsible party that the women were about to inaugurate a temperance crusade is wholly without foundation. The letter published in Wednesday's Tribune was merely a practical joke of a set of hummers. Similar notes were sent to other saloon-keepers. An interview with several prominent and earnest temperance men warrants the assertion that no movement of the kind has been contemplated for an instant. The saloons of this city are very orderly, and there is no excuse for interfering with their business while they scrupulously obey the State law and city ordinances.
