Was the Moon Always Dead?

Now that astronomers have almost by unanimous consent accepted the doctrine of the development of our system, which involves the belief that the whole mass of each member of the system was formerly gaseous with intensity of heat, they can no longer doubt that the moon once had an atmosphere of considerable density. The moon has, in fact, passed through the same changes as our own earth, though not necessarily in the same exact order.

Some Astronomical Notes for August.

August, this year, happens to be one of the eclipse months, and on the 8th there will be a partial eclipse of the Sun, invisible, however, in this country, and a total eclipse of the Moon on the 23d, which will be only partially visible here. On September 6th there will be another eclipse of the Moon, which will be no more visible in this country.

President Hayes is reported to have said, the other day, that Indians could not be introduced into the army, in any extended way with efficiency.

He added: "I had three Indians in my corps. As scouts they were unequalled. We could do nothing with them as soldiers. They would not drill, they would not keep rank, they would do nothing except in their wild Indian way. We were troubled by a sharp-shooter who had picked off our men and we could not reach him. I sent for one of these scouts. He came to my camp in a shabby way, seemed half sober, and was wholly inefficient. When I told him what I wanted, his face glowed, his eyes sparkled and he straightened himself up like a crested snake ready to strike, rolled his trousers up to his thighs, his sleeves to his shoulder-blades - to be as much of a savage as possible. He took his rifle, several rounds of ammunition, threw himself on the grass before there was any need of it, and wound himself along with the velocity and silence of a snake. Three shots brought the sharp-shooter down, when the scout returned perfectly exhilarated." -Tribune.

Hot-shoulder Remedies.

A new drink to supply the place of grain or barley water is recommended by the Times of India, "congee water" or the liquor in which rice has been boiled. This drink has three excellent qualities - it becomes impregnated with the properties of the rice boiled in it, and thus satisfies hunger; it quenches thirst, and is a capital draught in fever attacks; and lastly, when taken warm in bed, it is good for bad colds and influenza.

French polish for furniture can be made by putting half an ounce of shellac, the same quantity of gum arabic, and a quarter of an ounce of gum sandalwood, into a pint of spirits of wine.

Put them all together in a stone bottle near the fire, shaking it very often. As soon as the gums are dissolved it is ready for use.

It is a mistake to wash glass tumblers, goblets, and the like in hot water; if cold be used a brighter and clearer appearance is left when the glass is wiped dry. If the glass is particularly soiled, a pinch of soda in the water will cleanse it easily.

It is a fact not generally known that the August supply of Hubbard is the best for all preserving purposes, as, grown during the heat of summer, it requires less sugar than the spring supply. But should the summer have been a very dry one, the stalks are apt to become rather hollow and stringy; care should therefore be taken to select medium-sized stalks, brittle and full of juice.

During this dry season, when the pastures crackle under the feet, is the time when the sowed corn can be made available as fodder for cows. It is folly to expect a full flow of milk from milked cows, when the spring grass is over, and the pasture is dry. It is better to add a little more of the feed that the cows can get from them. The amount of milk from any cow must bear some proportion to the feed that she digests, and if there is a lack of fodder the flow of milk decreases. It pays to have near the barn a good strong growth of some kind of green fodder, and corn is easily raised, of rank growth, and cattle eat it with avidity. Beyond this, there is milk in it, and all that is required is the medium of a cow for its ready conversion. -Detroit Free Press.

The estimates of the Agricultural Department place the total of the wheat crop of the United States for the present year, at upwards of 225,000,000 bushels, 65,000,000 bushels more than that of last year. Of the total quantity, fully 100,000,000 bushels will be available for exportation. The cotton prospects were rarely more favorable than they are at present, and it is estimated that the product will be upwards of 3,000,000 bales. The sale abroad of the surplus wheat of the country will undoubtedly have a good effect upon the general business interests of the country; and a corresponding increase in the production of the United States, cannot for any very long period suffer from "droughts."

The subject of sowing fall wheat is beginning to attract considerable attention among our farmers. A thrifty and well-to-do farmer of Center Prairie puts the matter in this way: "For two years past fall wheat has yielded an average of twenty-five bushels per acre. This is so much better than spring wheat has averaged, that if I lose a crop occasionally I will still be ahead; but there is another advantage. If spring wheat fails I lose the profits of the ground for a year; if fall wheat fails I am only out of my labor and the seed. If it is a failure I know it by corn planting time, and give the ground a light spring and it is in excellent condition for corn."

It is claimed that a slight shock given to an apple tree will send canker worms spinning to the ground, and further, that if once off, these crawling pests could make no headway over dry, loose soil, providing their course was up hill. A complete barrier to their return is formed by heaping up dry ashes about the apple trees. Farmers that are suffering from the havoc of the canker worm should try this simple experiment and report the result. -Prairie Farmer.

A correspondent of the Country Gentleman in Massachusetts writes that the use of Paris green on apple trees attacked by canker worms has proved effective in every case, though heretofore these same trees have been defoliated by the worms. Trees in an adjoining field where the Paris green has not been used look as if fire had passed over them. A sharp light is the only resource left when the canker worms appear.

WELSH RABBIT.-Place on the fire, in a small shallow stew-pan, one quarter pint of ale, two ounces butter, a pinch of white pepper, and a teaspoonful of made mustard; add to the compound, when boiling, four ounces of grated cheese and a pinch of salt; stir until thoroughly mixed into a smooth paste; then pour it over three thin slices of bread, freed of crust and fried in butter; serve at once. -House-keeper.
