Very little wheat grown in the county; fall wheat will not average over twenty bushels, and spring wheat ten bushels per acre. Rye will make about twelve bushels and oats forty bushels per a re; in some localities the chinch bug and arm; worm have injured the oats. Hay was generally saved in good condition, and will average one and one half tons per acre. Corn is not at the bottom round, has ascended the ladder of in good condition and the outlook is not encour-usefulness, until, from the top round, he has laid aging for much over half an average yield per acre; the chinch bugs have destroyed hundreds of acres, and the dry weather has been unfavora-ble for late corn.
