Dr. Dimmick.

The funeral of Dr. L. N. Dimmick, of Santa Barbara, took place June 1st, from the Baptist church, of that city. The church was crowded and many were unable to obtain admission. The church was most beautifully decorated, and the casket was literally buried in flowers. Rev. Dr. Nisbet made the address. The flag on the city hall, at half mast, "denoted," says the Independent, "the great loss which the community has sustained." The following testimonial to the Doctor's memory, by the Independent, will be interesting to his many old friends yet remaining in this city, where he lived many years ago:

By the death of Dr. Dimmick our community has sustained a greater loss than can be understood by those who were not intimately acquainted with him. His great worth, his sterling qualities, his earnest, sympathetic nature and his unusual scientific attainments were so veiled under his unobtrusive retirement and modesty that those only who sought him out knew how large and generous was his character, and to what extent his efforts and desires extended for the benefit of those among whom he resided. I think I may safely say that I never spent an hour with him without making the reflection, "here is a man who lives and feels for others."

He seemed ever on the alert to plan and carry out something beneficial for our community, his adopted home.

At one time it would be the beautifying our streets and plazas with tasteful planting of trees and shrubbery. At another time his valuable attention would be earnestly given to sanitary measures for the city. Again he would devote his time, knowledge and reflection to building up our public library.

His climatic observations and reports have been the reliable basis for published information distributed abroad for the benefit of invalids and others.

Having profited himself from the climatic condition of Santa Barbara, he earnestly sought to make known its advantages to other sufferers. On this he seemed indefatigable, and although confined to his home by weakness for so many years, his desire to serve to the end that he performed was enormous. His quiet manner will be remembered by scores of visitors who have enjoyed the privilege of his conversation and advice relative to coming here for settlement; for even when suffering under pain and disease he seemed to forget his own troubles in his desire to serve others. Indeed the main spring of his character seemed to be to think, to plan and to do for others. "When comes such another?"

Had I my wish, I would have erected to his memory such a monument as he would have desired, viz.: Something eminently useful and beneficial to others. Can it not be done?
