Can This Be So?

One of the old, reliable stock arguments of the whisky crowd is, that reputable manufacturers and dealers will not do business with blind tiger keepers in prohibition states and the demand is supplied with impure liquors, which drive men to crime.

Now, if there is any one state in the union more completely controlled by the liquor power than is Pennsylvania we would like to know it, and this is what the whisky paper, *The Champion of Fair Play*, has to say:

"Pennsylvania is the dumping ground for all the impure liquor manufactured in the world and other states," declared Dairy and Food Commissioner Foust. He was speaking about the bill that is being prepared to stop the sale of adulterated liquors and beers. This bill makes it unlawful to sell or offer for sale wines, liquors and beers containing any chemical matter injurious to health.

"It is the opinion of the state chemists that most of the imported beers contain salicylic acid, which is used as a preservative. This act will make it necessary to label all blended brands. A fine of from \$60 to \$1,000 will be imposed upon the dealer offering for sale any adulterated drinks."

Questions For Candidates

These questions are being put to candidates for municipal offices by the law and order associations in some of the cities which have adopted the local option law:

First—What are your views regarding the local option law now operative in this city?

Second—If elected, what will be your attitude toward the thorough and honest enforcement of the present local option law?

Third—State your position and purpose upon the enforcement of ordinances against gambling and vicious resorts.

The answers to these questions are printed in the city papers, so that all citizens may be informed in ample time before election.
