RUSSIA.

We learn from St. Peterburg that the Commission appointed some time ago, to report upon the status of Jews in Russia, is believed to have recommended the extension of a large number of class privileges to them, and the recog-nition of all who at present serve the Government as being on an equality with the functionaries of the orthodox religion. These reforms have the approval of the educated classes of Russia, but are greatly condemned by the ecclesiastics and lower orders,—Globe.

Information reaches us that there is great distress among the Jews living in the Vistula Provinces. In most of the towns the Jews have established depots for the sale to the poor of flour and fuel at half the cost price.

MOROCCO.—The isolated cases of murder of Jews in Morocco, of which we have given particulars with painful iteration during the past few months, have culminated in a fiendish outrage upon the Jews of Fez. We publish details of this crime in another column. The Jewish population of Fez is very large. The Jews are mostly exceedingly poor, many are artizans, and a very few are reputed to be wealthy. These latter are merchants who act as agents for Gibraltar houses. The normal treatment of the Jews is brutal in the extreme. It will be rememberedthat Sir Moses Mont fiote undertook a mission to Morocco in 1864. undertook a mission to Morocco in 1864. The result of that mission was that the Sultan issued an Imperial Edict "in the Name of God, the Merciful and Gracious." commanding that the Jews should be treated justly, that they should be placed on a footing of equality with other subjects of the Empire, and that they should be protected. The mission was considered so successful that spewas considered so successful that special services of prayer and thanksgiving were held in nearly all the synagogues in England. Unfortunately, owing principally to the condition of the country and to the general fanatical cruelty and cupidity of the Arabs, not one of these promises, so solemnly given, and so gratefully received, have been observed. Fears are expressed by those well acquainted with Morocco that the whole country is drifting into anarchy. There is a mere apology for a government. is a mere apology for a government. The laws are bad, but their administration is worse. Justice can seldom be obtained for a non-Mahomedan. Almost every indication of civilization is absent from the country. The whole country presents a most depressing contrast to the neighboring French colony of Algeria. Even the Mahomedan peasants are cruelly robbed by the rapacious governors. Although at the very door, as it were, of Europe, the Empire is left to drift into anarchy and ruin, while its population is rapidly diminishing through the consequences of disease and normal adverse circumstances. The majority of the Jews who reside principally in the coast towns, have hitherto been under the protection of European Consuls. It has been contemplated for the last two years to withdraw this protection. Sir John H. D. Hay, the British Minister, unfortunately is in favor of this withdrawal. The joint Foreign Committees of the Board of Deputies and the Anglo-Jewish Association will no doubt direct the attention of Lord Salisbury to the outrage at Fez. It is to be fervently hoped that some more efficient means will be suggested for the further protection of the Jews of Morocco than the drastic method favored by Sir John Hay, who has given many assurances of his benevolent concern for the unfortunate Jews.—Jewish Chronicle.


