"A campaign to prevent cigarette smoking among boys, was launched today by J. A. E. Davis, in Marinette. He asserts that juvenile offenders invariably smoke, and that smoking alone is responsible for a big percentage of juvenile crime."

The Filthy Swine's Flesh.

"The three year old daughter of Everette Green, a laborer, is dead from trichinosis, caused by eating uncooked pork. The father and four other children are in a critical condition.

"The State Board of Health has been notified that an entire family of eleven is dying of trichinosis, at Stimpsonville, Wisconsin, and that there are several other families near-by affected. Two persons are already dead. There has been considerable trouble of this kind in the northwestern part of the State."

FORTY-THREE SHIPS LIE WRECKED on the shores in the vicinity of Melilla, Morocco, having been driven on the rocks and shoal by a terrific hurricane. Many large vessels put to sea to avoid being smashed against the jetties.

BERLIN HAS THE BEST street car depot in the world. It has just opened at Lichterfelde, a district on the eastern outskirts of the City, several years. Five hundred large electric cars can be accommodated upon twenty-six lines, which are laid abreast.

INCENDIARY FIRES are doing extensive damage to sugar plantations in Cuba that are owned by Americans. The situation has grown so serious that the government has ordered troops into the flame-devastated districts. The growing crop of sugar is threatened.

GERMANY LEADS THE WORLD in the development of cooperative credit associations. Its various systems are the subject of particular study by the special commission sent abroad last year by the government of the United States to investigate rural credits, and in modified form the principles that have operated so well in Germany and in other countries that have adopted them form the basis of legislation now pending before Congress.

NATIVES in the north of Malekula Island of the New Hebrides group have murdered and eaten six natives, teachers from the Walla Island mission station.

AN INDUSTRIAL ARMY of 1,700,000 men is in prospect as a result of a proposed working alliance between English miners, railwaymen, and transport workers, with a view to joint action in future disputes affecting one or more of the sections. The move originated with the miners. The transport workers have already acted favorably on the plan, and the railwaymen are now voting.

THE JAPANESE DIET was suspended this week by the Emperor, owing to the inability of the House of Peers and House of Representatives to agree on appropriations for the navy. The lower House had reduced naval estimates to \$62,000,000, and the House of Peers afterward diminished them to \$45,000,000, but this was not agreed to by the representatives, and a deadlock followed.

A GENERAL STRIKE has been declared in Peru, and all business is brought to a standstill. The transportation services are also stopped.

GREAT BRITAIN IS PUSHING a war on race track gambling. In the House of Lords a bill has been introduced to prevent the writing, publishing, or circulating within the United Kingdom of any advertisements relating to betting or tipsters' business.

A CRUSADE to end Berlin's orgies has been started by the Empress of Germany.

HUGH STRIKE DEMONSTRATIONS are being made in Rome, Italy, to test the strength of labor organizations, cavalry charges being necessary to disperse the crowds, which in several instances became mobs.

HOME RULE FOR IRELAND, since time immemorial, has opened and closed the time between of Parliament. And now it appears that only half of Ireland wants home rule. Ulster—the north part of the Island—says it will fight before it will have home rule administered by the south end, which is in the majority, and would, therefore, dominate in an Irish parliament. Indeed, say they, it were better to be ruled by an English parliament. The government of Britain now proposes that the south of Ireland get home rule, while the north of Ireland—Ulster—gets six years in which to think over whether they want home rule or not.

THE MEXICAN SITUATION has been changed somewhat by the capture of a suburb of Torreon by rebels, in which 106 persons were killed.

The "army" forces then pressed on to Torreon, the reports, which were rather uncertain, stated, and a whirlwind campaign was indicated.

ITALY'S TELEPHONE SERVICE has been taken over by the government through the purchase of the plants of the largest two operating companies. Several smaller companies were allowed to continue operations for ten years before being taken over.

County News.

Governor Dunne Sets Aside April 15th as State Road Day.

Lake county Highway Superintendent Russell today received an announcement from the executive quarters at Springfield informing him that April 15th is to be observed throughout the state as State Road day, and asking him to make the necessary steps towards arousing interest in the work.

It is the desire of the governor to have all the citizens of Lake county turn out on that day and aid, in whatever way they are able, the improving of the roads throughout the county. Farmers will be asked to scrape, grade and otherwise work on the roads in their vicinity, and the people of the city will be called upon to aid the street department to improve the conditions on the local thoroughfares.

Mr. Russell is enthusiastic over the idea and will send word to all the residents of the county notifying them of the Governor's wishes.
