ZION TEMPLE SITE GATES

Final Notice to the Public.

Zion Temple Site Gates will be closed within a few days. The Public should use the walk which has been built on the outside of the Temple Site. Visitors to Shiloh Tabernacle should go to the westside Gate at the southwest corner of the Tabernacle.

On Lord's Days the gates will be open to Officers, members and friends of the Christian Catholic Apostolic Church in Zion, and visitors to Shiloh Tabernacle. Persons not going to Shiloh Tabernacle will not be allowed to enter the Temple Site Grounds on the Lord's Day—in other words, persons will not be allowed to cross and recross the Temple Site Grounds on the Lord's Day. These Rules will be kindly but strictly enforced.

Zion Temple Site will increasingly become a sacred spot to all who love God and Zion; and if there ever was a time when the spirit of reverence needed to be taught and inculcated, it is today.

Traffic teaming is strictly prohibited in Shiloh Park. Let it be distinctly understood that the twelve foot walk running around the Temple Site have been placed there for the use of all persons who are WALKING; and in the future any person caught driving on these walks will be immediately arrested and prosecuted. All persons using buggies, automobiles, bicycles, motorcycles, and other light conveyances which are permitted in the Park, should use the drive-way.

It is our purpose, as soon as the gravel walks are properly packed, to cover same with stone-screenings. The time for making pig-paths and cow-paths across parks and private lots, has gone in Zion City; and citizens of Zion City ought to be above doing such things.

Rules and regulations are for the guidance of the people, in helping them to beautify the City and in making it more attractive.

Chief of Police Has Birthday.

The 57th birthday of Captain A. A. Walker, Chief of Police of Zion City, was celebrated in an informal way by members of the City Council after their regular meeting on Monday night. As soon as the Council adjourned, the mayor, aldermen, city attorney, and the city chaplain, Apostle F. M. Royall, went across the street to the fire and police station, and indulged in a social, with refreshments composed of watermelon on ice. The company had a happy time of it, and no doubt appreciated the efforts of the police in keeping Zion City free from the lawless mob that once ran riot.

Capt. Walker was raised on a farm at Thornton, Cook County, Illinois. He was Chief of Police at Hammond, Indiana for six years before coming to Zion City.
